A Week in Haiti

Three parishioners—Kittie Fitzgerald, Mike Conway and our Pastoral Associate for Social Justice, Kate Tromble—recently returned from a visit with our sister parish, St. Jean Baptiste. The parish was directly in the path of Hurricane Matthew last October and experienced a devastating amount of damage.

Traveling from Port Au Prince to Jeremie, and then onto Anse-d'Hainault, we saw the hurricane damage first hand: fallen trees, trees without leaves, ruined buildings and homes. Tarps covered the many homes without roofs and were even used in many cases as walls. But, we also saw some fortunate homes with shiny new metal roofs.

The people we spoke with about the approach of the hurricane said all knew that a storm was coming, just not how serious it would be. One woman described leaving her fallen house with her handicapped sister to seek shelter in the middle of the night. While the water rose around them and strong winds blew, they struggled to stay upright and keep walking. Fortunately some people helped them reach another house, and they were safe. Many other residents sought shelter in the newly rebuilt secondary school, which sits on higher ground.

After the storm, the parish was quickly able to send funds to Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and also directly to our sister parish to replace the church's fallen roof, help the parish school reopen and to purchase seeds to begin replanting coffee and fruit trees. CRS also distributed seeds for other crops. Much of this was possible thanks to the generous contributions of Trinity parishioners.



From the Pastor's Desk

*To show a heart grief-
 rent
 To starve thy sin,
 Not bin;
 And that's to keep thy Lent.*

Once you get past the archaic-sounding language in Robert Herrick's poem (published in full on the cover), its message of where to focus energy in Lent is, at least for me, very helpful.

I am of that generation that believed that Lent meant only giving something up. It's why, for instance, I don't take either milk or sugar in my coffee and tea. (Strangely, however, I have given up alcohol for Lent on many occasions but, "miraculously," have still found it to my taste on Easter Sunday!)

Perhaps it's because I am a man of "substance" that I like the idea of not having to starve my "bin" but only need to work on my sin (or many sins...). It appeals to me, as a native of Belfast, that I should fast from "strife and old debate and hate." (There's a famous quip: What's the definition of a balanced Ulsterman? Someone with a chip on both shoulders.)

I also appreciate the advice to give "my sheaf of wheat, and meat" to the hungry. It beggars my imagination that in the richest country in the world, we still had in 2015 more than 13 million children who suffer from what's euphemistically called food insecurity. How can this be? I know my fellow citizens to be hugely compassionate and generous but, somehow, as a nation we can't seem able to provide the most basic necessity to all our sisters and brothers.

I confess that the counsel to "circumcise thy life" makes me squirm involuntarily, but I do get that it refers to getting rid of all the unnecessary things that encumber my life. As a devoted thrift store customer, always on the lookout for outrageous bargains, I know a lot about clutter.

So, there it is. If, by chance, you happen to have a different Lenten poem as your favorite, please share it with me. I'm always searching for more of what Mary Oliver calls, "fires for the cold, ropes let down to the lost, something as necessary as bread in the pockets of the hungry."

Lenten Reflections on Love Week III

*"Love it is not jealous or boastful,
It is not arrogant or rude"
(1 Corinthians 13:4-7)*

In expanding on Paul's vision of love that it is not jealous or boastful, Pope Francis points out that love invites us to rise above ourselves, whereas envy closes us down. True love values the other person's achievements. It does not see him or her as a threat.

Think of how Jesus dealt with the Pharisees. He never boasted about his filial relationship with God to trump their knowledge. When they asked him about curing a man with a withered hand on the Sabbath, he pointed out that they would save one of their sheep if it fell into a hole on the Sabbath. Wasn't it then a greater act of love to heal this man, than to adhere to the Sabbath restrictions?

(Matthew 12: 9-14)

In discussing how love can be arrogant, Pope Francis notes that literally it means that we do not become "puffed up" before others. Yet what really makes us important, according to Francis and Paul, is a love that *understands, shows concern and embraces the weak.*

Our challenge this week is to look into our hearts and find if this type of love is taking root. A love that is not arrogant or rude, but kind and gentle can be a tough sell in a city where our worth is often measured in how much power and influence we wield. Yet a love that is gentle and kind is available to all of us when we talk with Jesus about our desire to love as he loved. How can we show a kind and gentle love this week, that challenges indifference to the weak in our city and our world?

Going forward, replanting is an urgent priority. Hurricane Matthew destroyed all of the crops in this agricultural area and many of the residents are subsistence farmers. During our visit we were happy to see that food (rice, beans and oil) is being provided by World Food Program to meet immediate needs. But that is not a long-term solution. The lines are long, only some are able to receive food, and many must come from long distances away in the surrounding mountain areas just for a chance at food. Everyone is making due as best they can, but replanting and returning to their previous agricultural life is important.

St. Jean Baptiste parishioners asked us to tell everyone at Holy Trinity how grateful they are for their generosity and quick response after the hurricane. They wish that they had something to give us in return, and so they give us their prayers. We expressed our gratitude for their friendship and prayers and ensured them that we also always pray for them.
