Easter Sunday! by James Martin, S.J.

It wasn't until I was a Jesuit novice at age 28 that I even knew there was such a thing as an Easter Vigil. In 1989, I was working in Kingston, Jamaica and went to my first Vigil Mass at a Jesuit-run parish. They had the Paschal candle, the singing of the Exsultet, the baptisms and the marvelous readings. I said to the Jesuit scholastic working there, "That was great! Jamaican culture is so interesting!"

And he said, "What part did you find the most interesting?"

"The whole thing," I said, "especially that song you sang!" It took him a few minutes before it dawned on him that this new cultural event was also a new religious event for me.

Nothing had prepared me for the Vigil. Who knew that the church had this tradition? How was I to know what it would be like?

It must have been the same (but on a colossally different scale) for the disciples on the morning of the first Easter. They had no idea what to expect. They were wholly unprepared for the event that would change their lives—and ours. The Gospel stories show this: everyone is confused on Easter Sunday. Mary mistakes Jesus for the gardener; others doubt her story when she tells it later. Saint Thomas will doubt it even after many of his friends tell it to him.

That's why my favorite painting of the Easter Sunday is this one by Eugène Burnand, of Peter and John running to the tomb, looking both hopeful and confused and worried. How often this is the case for us. We don't fully trust that God will really triumph this time—though God has always done so in the past. We hope, though we're still a little worried.

But we know how it ends. We know what Peter and John are about to see in the tomb.

And more importantly, who they are about to meet.

May your Easter be filled with the joy of the Risen Christ, who waits for us after all of our crucifixions, holding out the promise of surprising new life.

Living Our Mission

This week's column is written by Anne Koester, RCIA Coordinator. The Pastor's Desk will resume next week.

To celebrate our new mission statement created during the PAR process, we will periodically feature in this column reflections and stories that illustrate the meaningful work of our Parish in lieu of a Pastor's Desk.

During the Easter Vigil, Holy Trinity joyfully welcomed eight adults (Josev Aquino, Gabriele Brennan, Jake Brooke, Cordelia Chansler, Caity Dee, Lili Kazemi, Matthew Poldy and Jeff Steinberg) and three children (Nikita Duncan, Sophia Duncan and Alexander Thornton) into the Christian community through the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Three of them reflect on what brought them to this moment.

Josev Aquino: "I seek baptism to give thanks to God.

"Coming to the U.S. in 2008, I experienced tough challenges. I left my dad and friends back home in the Philippines and felt extremely lonely. I thought that God had left me alone and wasn't hearing my prayers.

"But last year, I recognized that there were people who I can always come to and who cared. I have come to realize that God was looking after me, communicating through the people around me. I seek baptism because I believe in God."

Gabriele Brennan: "After being raised in a Christian household and going to a Baptist Church, I was always intrigued by the loyal following of the Catholic Church.

"As a teenager, I did not complete the full faith process at our Baptist Church. I lost my father to cancer when I was 26. As a result, my faith grew stronger, and my mother always encouraged me to grow it even more. Then, I married a Catholic, and watched our three daughters sit intently at Sunday School and during our daily prayers. They were full of hope and love and asked many questions. My sister also married a Catholic and went through RCIA several years ago, which was a nice inspiration for me.

"The RCIA process has been a 'formalization' of faith and true educational process that I feel honored to be a part of."

Jeff Steinberg: "My seeking Baptism has come about through a 48-year process.

"My dear wife Michele is Italian-American Catholic, and I have been attending church services with her since we met in 1969. In the past decade, we have gone through some real trials, first with the prolonged illness and death of Michele's brother Steven and then the death of her mother Ruth one year ago. Those trials put the issue of my own faith on the table in a profound fashion.

"On Palm Sunday 2016, Michele and I attended Mass at Holy Trinity for the first time. We experienced at once the warmth and caring community of faith, and that inspired me to fully seek communion with Christ here. Little did I know on that Palm Sunday that we would also lose Michele's mother within two weeks. Soon after the funeral, I began the RCIA process. I thank God every day for drawing me here."

Good Faith Communities Coalition

On Wednesday, **April 5**, the Board of Zoning Adjustment approved the development of a short-term housing facility in Ward 3. This building will join a network of 7 facilities across DC that replace the troubled DC General family shelter.

Good Faith Communities Coalition, an inter-faith homelessness advocacy group which began at Holy Trinity 8 years ago, successfully organized 14 congregations, including Holy Trinity, in support of the facility. An additional 110 individuals also supported the facility, and the Zoning Board Chair specifically mentioned the high level of community support for the facility as a reason for its approval. This was an important use of the faith community's voice -- speaking up for families to have a safe place to call home.
