

Walking with Jesus: A Way Forward for the Church By: Pope Francis

In a foreword to Pope Francis's new book, Archbishop Blase J. Cupich offers some insights into Pope Francis's encouragement that we walk with Jesus, as did St. Ignatius of Loyola whose feast day is July 31st.

This is an important and needed book. It collects the words and teaching of Pope Francis under the intriguing theme of "walking with Jesus." The Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles describe the earliest disciples as those who walked with Jesus and referred to their life of faith as "the way." In these essays, Pope Francis urges Christians in our time to take up the journey again and to renew their faith. But more importantly, he shows us the way, as each of us struggles with the question: How exactly do I walk with Jesus today?" The pope does so by drawing from the rich spiritual legacy of St. Ignatius of Loyola as well as his pastoral encounters across a long lifetime as a priest, bishop, and now pope.

St Ignatius saw that the renewal and transformation of individuals and the Church could happen only by putting Christ in the center of our lives and by staying in his company. Under



The Ignatian vision of renewal began with those in the Society of Jesus, but it was destined to be a life-giving spiritual force for the entire Church. And Pope Francis clearly shares this spiritual heritage with the Church at large. All of us are summoned to walk with Jesus and to be his companions---the ones who share his life, his mission, and his destiny. At the same time, while we aspire to be companions of Jesus, we know that already he is our companion on the journey. He walks with us as a steady presence of hope and love when we make our pilgrim way, especially when we encounter difficulties and challenges.



From the Pastor's Desk

As I approach the end of my time with you as pastor, I wondered what I was writing in this space when I first arrived at Holy Trinity in the summer of 2008. The following is taken from the "From the Pastor..." column in the September 7, 2008, bulletin:

For all Catholics, nothing is more important that celebrating Eucharist together... After Eucharist, for Catholics in a <u>Jesuit</u> parish, nothing is more important than learning and practicing Ignatian spirituality. If our fundamental identity comes from our Baptism and our celebration of Eucharist, Ignatian spirituality specifies that identity. It is our chosen way of encountering and relating to God. All Catholics celebrate Eucharist together, proclaim the Gospel, and do social justice, but Jesuits and their colleagues in ministry also practice Ignatian spirituality. Indeed, Ignatian spirituality animates everything we do.

One's spirituality defines how one understands God and how one approaches God. While all spiritualities help one enter into communion with God, different spiritualities do this in different ways. For instance, some persons seek communion with God by renouncing and withdrawing from the world; others seek communion with God by embracing Him in the world.... Ignatian spirituality is based on St. Ignatius of Loyola's distinctive way of encountering and experiencing God, but Ignatius believed – and Jesuits and others have found – that his way has application beyond his time and culture.

Ignatius experienced God as laboring in creation, constantly drawing creation into himself. For Ignatius, God is never remote from or uninvolved in the world. Rather, God continuously gives himself to and dwells in all creatures, making himself discoverable in his creatures. Accordingly, we who practice Ignatian spirituality speak of "finding God in all things."

Ignatius believed that, if God is present in all things, then God can be found in activity as well as in solitude. ... Accordingly, we who practice Ignatian spirituality describe ourselves as "contemplatives in action." We seek God, listen to his voice, and try to discern his will through contemplation. Then, having discerned God's will, we try to carry it out vigorously and with attention to the task at hand. In other words, Ignatius believed that both contemplation and action are necessary. ...

Ignatius designed his *Spiritual Exercises* to help the one who does them to be open to the same encounter with God that he had and to the same life-changing transformation that he experienced. In short, Ignatius hoped that the one who makes the *Exercises* will experience God's gracious love as he did, and that one will be freed by the experience of God's love for whole-hearted, loving service to God and one's brothers and sisters.

Celebration of Eucharist and the practice of Ignatian spirituality, especially the *Spiritual Exercises*, must be at the center of our parish life. Everything else we do should start with these and flow out from these.

Seven years later, I still believe that this is true.

Training Sessions for New Lectors, Communion Ministers and Sacristans

New ministers are needed to assist at weekend Eucharist. Lectors proclaim the Old and New Testament readings and often lead the General Intercessions. Strong presence and good public speaking skills, as well as clear diction and the ability to project are necessary. Communion Ministers assist with the distribution of Holy Communion. Prayerfulness, attentiveness, helpfulness, and a welcoming presence are necessary qualities of new Communion Ministers. Sacristans are liturgical ministers who work "behind the scenes" to prepare the bread and wine, vessels, and other items for the liturgy. Attention to detail and care for the liturgy are necessary to be a sacristan. Serving as a sacristan a perfect liturgical ministry for those who want to be involved in a less "visible" way. Training will be provided for all new ministers.

As Pope Francis describes walking with Jesus, he also describes the surprisingly powerful impact of walking with him in our life together. Not only are we companions who walk with Jesus and not only is he our companion who walks with us, but in his company we also become companions to one another. This reality is so important in our cultural moment, which often is marked by a hypercompetitive spirit and is fixated on an unhealthy individualism, to the point that we are left feeling isolated as individuals and divided as a community. To walk with Jesus in the company of others describes the very essence of the Church. And reclaiming this reality will generate a true renewal of our life together.

Americans are practical people. When we think about renewal and transformation for a business, for a public institution, or even for the Church, we naturally gravitate to reorganizing structures. In our practicality and our can do attitude, we often strain to figure things out and struggle to make things work. Pope Francis offers us an entirely different path for renewal, especially in the Church. For him, renewal is not about tinkering with structures or doing a new thing. Rather, it means reclaiming the centrality of Jesus Christ. And that, in turn, depends entirely on a new spirit and a new heart. The renewal that Pope Francis shows us is the conversion of heart that happens by walking with Jesus, by being in close contact with him. This is why he constantly insists that we read a passage of the Gospels day-by-day and reflect and pray on it, whether we are on public transport or at home. That is walking with Jesus.

When we make that kind of day-by-day commitment to walk with Jesus, we begin to live in a world of grace, depending on more than our human efforts. When Jesus walks with us and is our guide, Pope Francis tells us, we will keep discovering the deepest truth that makes us free and gives us life. The grace is already given to us to be uncovered, discovered, and embraced.

The vision of Pope Francis contained in these pages is not new. It is the perennial message of the gospel. And although it is not new, he freshly proposes a way to be with Jesus in our time, to learn from him, and to draw life from him. And that is why I am convinced that many will be inspired and renewed by the blessed words of the Holy Father in this very important and needed book.

"Living our vocation to be protectors of God's handiwork is essential to a life of virtue; it is not an optional or secondary aspect of our Christian experience." (217)

PRACTICE Small Acts of Love "Saint Therese of Lisieux invites us to practice the little way of love, not to miss out on a kind word, a smile or any small gesture which sows peace and friendship. An integral ecology is also made up of simple daily gestures which break with the logic of violence, exploitation and selfishness." (230)

An "integrated ecology" reminds us of our interconnectedness and our "duty to care for creation through little daily actions". Being intentional about practicing small daily habits such as "turning off unnecessary lights" or not wasting food can be an "act of love" and help us live in solidarity with those in most need.

ACTION: Practice a new small act of love as a way of living solidarity with those in most need and being a more responsible steward of God's gifts. For ideas, consider the list Pope Francis includes:

Use less heating or air conditioning

Avoid using paper and plastic.

Reduce water consumption.

Reuse and recycle.

Don't waste food.

Show care for other living beings.

Use public transportation or carpool.

Plant trees.

Turn off lights & reduce electricity use.



Pilgrimage Opportunity with Fr. Kevin Gillespie, S.J.


