Being Catholic in an Election Season

In case it isn't abundantly clear from TV, radio, social media and your neighbors' lawns, it is election season. Although this election year has been particularly vitriolic, engaging in the political process and trying to influence and shape the moral character of our civil society is part of the mission given to us by Jesus Christ. As Pope Francis reminds, "A good Catholic meddles in politics, offering the best of himself, so that those who govern can govern." First and foremost, then, we must engage. We must vote.

Neither the Conference of Bishops nor the Archdiocese of Washington dictates how we should vote. That is an informed decision grounded in faith that each Catholic must make for herself or himself.

You might begin that decision making process by considering the person of Jesus and his concern for our brothers and sisters most in need. Also, consider the principles of Catholic Social Teaching such as the sanctity of all life and the dignity of all people, the essential relatedness of all human persons and the call to live in community, solidarity, the preferential option for the poor and vulnerable, the dignity of work and workers and concern for and stewardship of all God's creations.

You might use Jesus' example and these guiding principles to contemplate how the policies being offered by a candidate align with a fundamental concern for those most in need, the dignity of human life and work, our call as Catholics to live in community and concern for God's creation. To help you with this contemplation, the Ignatian Solidarity Network has prepared an *Ignatian Examen for Civic Life*, which guides one through a conversation with God about the relationship between Gospel values and political engagement. You may find the examen at *www.ignatiansolidarity.net*.

Other resources that may help you discern this relationship as you prepare to vote are available from the US Conference of Bishops (*www.usccb.org*) and the Jesuit Conference (*www.jesuit.org*).

In the coming weeks, we will be reflecting more deeply on how Gospel values and Catholic Social Teaching issues in light of the coming election through the Social Justice newsletter. From the Pastor's Desk

While the Redskins' season kickoff did not prove successful, the start of a new parish season provided many successful efforts; a host of activities infused the life of our parish. In addition to Holy Trinity School moving into fall gear, our RCIA program directed by Anne Koestler and Fr. Ryan resumed, as did our Religious Education program, directed by Judith Brusseau and assisted by Mary Tull, Kathleen Butler, and Ellen Toupps. This past Sunday, more than 700 children began attending our Sunday morning religion classes, and they were greeted with more than 60 volunteer catechists. Did you notice how quickly the dozens of donuts disappeared after the 9am Masses?!

In addition, our Parish Assessment & Renewal (PAR) Project entered a new phase with the arrival of the Parish Evaluation Project (PEP) team lead by Fr. Tom Sweetser, S.J. and ably assisted by Ms. Kathy Seitz and Ms. Jessamnyn Amerzquita. At each one of last weekend's eight Masses, one of the team members spoke and asked three questions: What are the things that we at HTP should keep doing? What are things that we should let go of and stop doing? What could we start doing?

The team met collectively with our parish staff and members of the Parish Council, our Parish Finance Committee, and various other parish committees as well as with members of our PAR Oversight Team. They have also met individually with more than 40 of us.

Last Saturday, approximately 50 of us engaged with the PEP team in a 3-hour session where a 36-page report was discussed. More than 500 Holy Trinity parishioners participated in the survey. One remarkable finding was that HTP draws from 74 zip codes! At the meeting, parish concerns found in the survey were prioritized into three goals:

- Providing a more welcoming environment;
- Better communication throughout the parish on all levels;
- Inviting new volunteers for all areas of parish life.

This Sunday there be a Town Hall Meeting at 3pm in Trinity Hall for anyone who wishes to add his/her voice to the PAR process. The Assessment Phase of the PAR process will then move into a Renewal Phase that is designed to move HTP strategically forward.

Finally, last Sunday parishioners assembled to share our memories of Fr. Leo Murray, S.J. Fr. Leo passed away this past summer, but the memories of his 12 years at the parish remain alive. The sharing of stories was consoling to each of us. A similar sharing of parishioners who remember Fr. Jim English, S.J. who also passed this summer will take place on Saturday, October 1 at 1pm.

Rite of Acceptance into the Catechumenate: What It Tells Us About Who We Are

During today's 11:30am Mass, we celebrate the Rite of Acceptance into the Catechumenate with adult inquirers in the RCIA process who are seeking to be baptized in the Catholic Church. This rite marks the start of the Catechumenate Period, which is a time of instruction. prayer, and spiritual formation.

The Rite of Acceptance will tell our inquirers something about who they are and are becoming, as they respond more fully to the Gospel and the invitation to a relationship with Christ and the Christian community. The rite also reveals something about ourselves: listen closely during the Rite of Acceptance, when the presider proclaims us to be a community that welcomes the catechumens with love and that stands ready to help them (RCIA 55). By our participation in the rites and formation of the Catechumenate Period, we, the Church, the baptized body of Christ, bring forth new life.
