From the Pastor's Desk

A parishioner who was deeply involved in the planning and design of the construction of the Parish Center and the renovation of the chapel in the late 1990s recently gave me a three-ring binder full of old memos, letters, architectural drawings, and meeting minutes relating to that project.

Among the materials in the binder was a June 1995 issue of Holy Trinity News, a monthly newsletter the parish published in those days. An article on the front page of that newsletter was headlined, "Logo Adopted as Unifying Parish Symbol." A graphic of that newly designed logo was shown alongside the headline. This is the same logo that still appears on the masthead of our parish bulletin and nearly all of our parish stationery and brochures.

The point of that 1995 article was that the parish was deliberately moving away from the use of multiple logos and symbols on its stationery, certificates, and other parish publications in favor of a single "official" logo that would serve as a visual characterization of the parish. Fr. Larry Madden, the pastor at the time, was quoted in the article saying, "Our logo and other visual images are a way of saying we share a common commitment, we speak the same language of peace and love."

Interestingly, a couple months ago, even before I saw this old article, we confirmed this parish policy of having a single logo for the parish and its ministries. I asked all parish staff, including our parish school staff, to use this logo and only this logo on all stationery, brochures, certificates, and websites.

Yes, the logo is just a sign, but like any good sign, it serves to express a shared meaning and interest. The shared meaning is our common identity in Jesus and our participation in his dying and rising. Our shared interest is becoming one with him and with each other, a Body that by its vitality and unity reflects the relationship Jesus has with us.

Of course, much more significant for our unity than any logo is our gathering at Sunday Eucharist to remember Jesus, to give thanks to him, and to share his body and blood so that we might become more one, might be more completely transformed into that Body. I have said repeatedly since I became your pastor that there is nothing we do at Holy Trinity that is more important than celebrating Eucharist together. Everything else we do, including our promotion and practice of Ignatian spirituality, simply deepens our union and enables us to live it out with Jesus and one another.

Conversely, there is no greater threat to our parish those attitudes and actions that can lead to division. Sometime this can be simply trying to do too much. Pretty soon we lose focus and end up doing very little or nothing together. The parish simply becomes a place where individuals carry on personal works. Much more noxious is every failure to exercise what Ignatius call "the presupposition," that is, a habitual readiness to think the best of the other, to give the other the benefit of any doubt regarding the other's intentions and motives.

These past couple months have been a wonderful experience for me. Many of you have assured me of your prayers and best wishes, and I thank you. In turn, my prayer and wish for you is that you be even abundantly blessed with the Spirit of Jesus, and that Holy Trinity be a community in whom the risen Jesus moves freely and without hindrance, loving the world for the Father.

IGNATIAN SPIRITUALITY

Pope Francis, the Jesuit Conference and the Kino Border Initiative

“Our Values on the Line: Migrant Abuse and Family Separation at the Border” (www.jesuits.org) revealed that more than one-third of deported migrants experienced some type of abuse or mistreatment at the hands of U.S. immigration authorities, including theft, physical abuse, verbal abuse and inhumane detention conditions.



Commissioned by the Jesuit Conference of Canada and the United States and the Kino Border Initiative (KBI), a bi-national organization in Nogales, Arizona, and Nogales, Sonora, Mexico, the report details the results of an in-depth survey of 358 Mexican migrants deported from the United States to the border city of Nogales, Mexico. The survey was conducted between July 2014 and March 2015.

“The church recognizes the urgency of this issue and the suffering that men, women and children go through because they're forced to leave their places of origin, either because of economic need, violence or family separation,” said Jesuit Father Sean Carroll, executive director of the KBI. “These experiences really harm and undermine their God-given human dignity, and so the church recognizes the need to be present to these people and to change the structures that cause their deep suffering and pain.

The study showed that family members apprehended together by the Border Patrol were systematically separated from each other and were deported to different ports of entry or were deported days, weeks or months apart. Two out of three migrants surveyed who crossed into the U.S. with immediate family members were separated from at least one of those family members by the Border Patrol during the process of detention and deportation.

As Pope Francis said in his message for the 2015 World Day of Migrants and Refugees, “It is necessary to respond to the globalization of migration with the globalization of charity and cooperation, in such a way as to make the conditions for migrants more humane.”
