## **Kino: the Father on Horseback**

Though Eusebio Francisco Kino, S.J., lived more than 300 years ago, his influence and legacy extend far beyond the time and place he called home. Kino was born in Italy, educated in Austria, and spent his last 24 years in the Pimería Alta (present-day southern Arizona and northern Sonora, Mexico). He was an extraordinary geographer, cartographer, explorer, astronomer, missionary and, above all, advocate for human rights and social justice.

The breadth of his impact is apparent throughout the region. Kino Parkway, a major thoroughfare in Tucson, bears his name, statues dedicated to him can be found in Mexico, Arizona, California and even the U.S. Capitol, a Mexican wine called Padre Kino gives a nod to the zinfandel grape variety he introduced to the area, and a light blue copper silicate mineral discovered in 1970 was named Kinoite in his honor.

Kino traveled over 50,000 square miles within the region and was known affectionately as *el Padre a caballo*—the Father on horseback.

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## **US Catholic Bishops Denounce Administration Decision to Terminate DACA**

The President and Vice President of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), along with the Chairmen, have issued a statement denouncing the Administration's termination of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program:

"The cancellation of the DACA program is reprehensible. It causes unnecessary fear for DACA youth and their families. These youth entered the U.S. as minors and often know America as their only home. The Catholic Church has long watched with pride and admiration as DACA youth live out their daily lives with hope and a determination to flourish and contribute to society: continuing to work and provide for their families, continuing to serve in the military, and continuing to receive an education. Now, after months of anxiety and fear about their futures, these brave young people face deportation. This decision is unacceptable and does not reflect who we are as Americans.

The Church has recognized and proclaimed the need to welcome young people: 'Whoever welcomes one of these children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me' (Mark 9:37). Today, our nation has done the opposite of how Scripture calls us to respond. It is a step back from the progress that we need to make as a country. Today's actions represent a heartbreaking moment in our history that shows the absence of mercy and good will, and a short-sighted vision for the future. DACA youth are woven into the fabric of our country and of our Church, and are, by every social and human measure, American youth.

We strongly urge Congress to act and immediately resume work toward a legislative solution. We pledge our support to work on finding an expeditious means of protection for DACA youth.

As people of faith, we say to DACA youth – regardless of your immigration status, you are children of God and welcome in the Catholic Church. The Catholic Church supports you and will advocate for you."

Over 780,000 youth received protection from the DACA program since its inception in 2012. DACA provided no legal status or government benefits but did provide recipients with temporary employment authorization to work in the U.S. and reprieve from deportation. ## Living Our Mission: Accompany One Another in Christ

For one Mass a weekend, I decide not to be the Pastoral Associate for Liturgy and sit in the back of the church to participate fully in the liturgy (without critique). A few weeks ago, I sat in the last row at the Vigil Mass. It was the loudest Mass I can remember—a father dragging a misbehaved son outside repeatedly (with the door slamming behind them), a pre-teen flipping the pages of the Catholic Standard (go figure), and an (obviously starved) wailing baby. Finally, after the Second Reading, the church fell into a gracious silence until one of the young ones belted out “Alleluia! Alleluia!” The assembly chuckled together and the musicians chimed in on cue. It was perfect.

The fact is, children are at a disadvantage at the liturgy. The liturgy speaks to an adult reality. We engage the mysteries of life and death, love and forgiveness with multisyllabic (and sometimes nonsensical) words, profound symbolic language, and rites that some adults don't understand.

So what's a parent to do?

- 1. Be proud you and your family are at Mass.** Your presence tells your children that Sundays are for the Lord and that church is an important part of your life. Despite other options, Mass on Sunday is who we are and it's what we do.
- 2. Plan ahead.** Maybe your child needs a Bible coloring book or a child's missal. Teach them the prayers of the Mass. Have them learn your favorite church songs and sing them at bedtime. Ask them to predict what color the priest will wear.
- 3. Sit near the front.** It seems counterintuitive, but children are more engaged by action than the back of someone's head. Narrate to your child what's happening. Ask him/her what's coming next.
- 4. Be a good example.** If you're reading the bulletin or checking your iPhone, your child notices. Sing, pray, and show your child how to behave at Mass.
- 5. Know that you can leave.** Meltdowns, crying fits, and energized children are to be expected. If you need to leave, go up the ramp on the left side of the church and through the glass doors to the Parish Center. There are benches and an audio stream of the Mass.

Children are not the future of the Church. They *are* the church. And our children will never learn how to be Christians at worship if we don't teach them. The child who cried out “Alleluia” knew what was coming next. He might have been disruptive to some, but his parents taught him the liturgy. Good for them.

And, to adults, like me, have a bit of patience, encourage parents around you by your good example and welcoming smile (not the frown of mine from a few weeks ago), and, above all, sing “Alleluia” with the children around you.

## Daily Mass Intentions

## STEWARDSHIP



### Meet Rock Schuler

Join us in welcoming Rock Schuler to Holy Trinity! As Director of Stewardship, Rock will work to sustain our meaningful programs and plan new initiatives.

Rock grew up in Casper, Wyoming, a place which helped cultivate his life-long appreciation of the outdoors. Intent on pursuing a career in politics, Rock initially studied political economics at the University of Wyoming. However, his career trajectory changed when he entered into Seminary at Seabury-Western in Chicago and specialized in Plains Indian spirituality and in Organizational Development. As an Episcopal priest, Rock spent 20 years as a parish pastor focused on developing community-based ministries, all of which required extensive fundraising. He is most proud of his brief service on the Wind River Indian Reservation, where he learned a great deal from the local Jesuit priest; the work he did to start an outpatient addiction recovery program in Pennsylvania; and an award he received from the Jewish Community Relations Council for the promotion of justice. Over the past 10 years, Rock shifted his attention exclusively on the support of ministry and community service through fundraising. In this capacity, Rock has supported individuals with intellectual disabilities and serious mental illnesses, as well as efforts to close health care disparities among populations long disadvantaged by systemic discrimination. Rock continues to enjoy the outdoors through kayaking, running and hiking; he also spends a lot of time reading and listening to NPR.

In the numerous missions and chapels he founded, Kino ensured they could become self-sufficient by introducing new seeds, fruits, herbs and cattle. He has been called "Arizona's first rancher." Kino also proved Baja California was a peninsula and not an island (as previously thought) by leading an overland expedition to the area. His discoveries transformed economic growth in the area and his maps and manuscripts were the basis for the maps of record of the Pimería for 150 years.

Kino always practiced tolerance and respect and advocated for the Native Americans who were often forced into slavery or conscripted at the silver mines by the Spanish colonialists. He once rode the 1,200 miles to Mexico City on horseback to personally deliver his report to colonial officials detailing the unjust treatment of the Pimería natives.

His extensive impact has led to a canonization effort since 1960. Currently, he is still in step one of the process and has been recognized as a "Servant of God." In 2006, documents weighing more than 130 pounds were sent to the Vatican to support step two, approval for the title of "Venerable." Ultimately, one miracle must be attributed to Kino for beatification and two for canonization.

Today, organizations such as the Cultural Association of Padre Eusebio F. Chini (the original spelling of his surname) in Italy, the Kino Heritage Society in Arizona, the Kino Border Initiative on the United States-Mexico border, and the Kino Heritage Fruit Tree Project (a joint effort of the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum and the University of Arizona) preserve the history, legacy and spirit of his work for future generations.

In October, a group of Holy Trinity parishioners will be making a trip to the Kino Border Initiative, a binational organization whose mission is to promote immigration policies that affirm the dignity of the human person through assistance, accompaniment and education.
