The Challenge of Racism Today

This past November, Cardinal Wuerl released a Pastoral Letter to the Clergy, Religious and Laity of the Church of Washington. A bishop typically releases a pastoral letter to mark a specific event in the Church or to highlight a significant issue in the Church or culture. In his letter, Cardinal Wuerl confronts our culture and the scandal of racism: "We are all aware of incidents both national and closer to home that call attention to the continuing racial tensions in our society." He goes on to say that, "in spite of numerous positive advances and the goodwill of many, many people, too many of our brothers and sisters continue to experience racism."

The Cardinal makes it clear that "the divisions we face today that are based on the color of one's skin or ethnic background are obviously not part of God's plan...the human race is rooted in the loving, creative act of God, who made us and called us to be family—all God's



children—made in God's image and likeness. There is no basis to sustain that some are made more in the image of God than others."

Where do we start to address racism? "To address racism, we need to recognize two things: that it exists in a variety of forms, some more subtle and others more obvious; and that there is something we can do about it even if we realize that what we say and the steps we take will not result in an immediate solution to a problem that spans generations. We must however, confront this issue with the conviction that in some personal ways we can help resolve it.

"Intolerance and racism will not go away without a concerted awareness and effort on everyone's part. Regularly we must review the commitment to drive it out of our hearts, our lives and our community. While we may devise all types of politically correct statements to proclaim racial equality, without a change in the basic attitude of the human heart we will never move to that level of oneness that accepts each other for who we are and the likeness we share as images of God."

Cardinal Wuerl indicates that the pastoral letter is not intended to be the final word, but rather what he hopes is the start of robust dialogue that guides us toward reconciliation. In the spirit of dialogue, please join us today, **Sunday January 14**, at **2:30pm in McKenna Hall** for an interfaith discussion of how people of faith can respond to the challenge of racism. We will be joined by clergy and congregants from all parts of our Georgetown faith community, making for a robust conversation about how live our prayers for a more just society.

Living Our Mission: Accompany One Another in Christ

This week's column is written by parishioner Anthony Tambasco, Professor Emeritus, Georgetown University

For over 100 years, January 18-25 been celebrated as an Octave for Church Unity, encouraging Catholics and Protestants to pray as Christ prayed for unity—something becoming even more important in today's world. We have shifted from envisioning uniformity, with all becoming Catholic, to striving for unity within a healthy pluralism, and have expanded from ecumenical (or inter-Christian) dialogue to not only interreligious dialogue, but also dialogue with the non-religious.

Indeed, if we could summarize the impetus from the Second Vatican Council, it would be in the Church's self-understanding as a pilgrim people—a people not necessarily with all the answers, but with development of doctrine in dialogue with the signs of the times, with openness to the world (especially to the poor), with respect for freedom of conscience, and with affirmation of the redeeming qualities of religions and even of the sincere heart of atheists. Thus, internal Church renewal requires external dialogue; it is not a superfluous option. As a post-Vatican II product, Pope Francis both lives by and teaches this significant opportunity.

In keeping with this vision, the Superior General of the Society of Jesus, Arturo Sosa, has called all Jesuit ministries to communal discernment on their roles in bringing reconciliation to the world and on their particular apostolic preferences for the present moment—and to do this within deepening dialogue with other cultures and religions.

Holy Trinity has already engaged in such dialogue, so it is a question of extending and deepening such activity. To that end, parishioners John Borelli, Paula McCabe, Jim Thessin, and I met with some parish leaders last spring to explore what could be done further. Then, I hosted a dinner for four inter-faith couples to get their input. It seems that a prime place, though not exclusive, to explore inter-faith interaction would be among interfaith couples at Holy Trinity. To that end, I would like to gather more of such couples for informal dialogue to see what the needs are and how to meet them. Couples are invited to contact me at *tambasca@georgetown.edu* so I can arrange for some other brainstorming sessions. Eventually, discussion will be opened to all interested in promoting this significant movement of our times.

My wife, Anne Stewart, and I have also established an endowed fund for interfaith education and interaction. The intention of the fund is to encourage not only a dialogue of ideas but also a dialogue of life, experience, and social action. Please visit www.trinity.org/give to learn more.
