## Spirit@Work: Faith & Friendship at Camp Maria

Nestled on Breton Bay in southern Maryland—two hours away from the gridlock commutes and nonstop sirens of D.C.—lives the Camp Maria Retreat Center, home to the Young Adult Community (YAC) Retreat. Held in the spring and fall each year, this peer-led retreat is a weekend for young adults to delve deeper into their faith through reflections rooted in Ignatian spirituality.

Victoria Thompson, former co-chair of the YAC Steering Committee, has been a part of five YAC Retreats. She assisted in the initial planning stages for the May retreat, bringing together the young adults who will organize the retreat and lead the prayers, small group discussions, and thematic talks.

“I really enjoy Camp Maria as a retreat location because of its proximity to the water and restful location,” said Thompson. “I find peace and clarity of mind when I’m out in nature, and this retreat location definitely makes that possible for me.”

Each YAC Retreat’s theme centers on an important phase of life and celebrating God’s love in those moments. The May retreat is called Spirit@Work, focusing on making decisions, spiritual guidance, and discernment using the tools of St. Ignatius of Loyola. YAC Retreats are designed to meet people where they are in their faith journey and personal life.

“It offers a chance to escape from daily personal and professional responsibilities in order to focus on their faith,” said Marianne Grima, a three-time YAC Retreat participant. “I find that oftentimes I lose sight of my spiritual goals, and love that these retreats give me a chance to re-connect and re-energize my faith life.”

For many participants, they become more connected with Christ through the community formed with their fellow retreatants.

“In a secular society, it can feel isolating when trying to live a faithful life, which makes things unnecessarily difficult,” said Mike Daniel, who attended his first retreat this past October. “Being able to exercise that part of your life with peers really helps strengthen resolve at an individual level to live one’s faith.”

In addition to a deeper connection to one’s faith, participants take away new friendships.

“During the bonfire on Saturday night, a large group of retreatants, including myself, sat by the warm fire, sang cheerful campfire songs while someone played a guitar, and shared personal stories,” said Thompson. “Few people—if

## From the Pastor's Desk

*Nothing is so beautiful as Spring –  
 When weeds, in wheels, shoot long and lovely and lush;  
 Thrush's eggs look little low heavens, and thrush  
 Through the echoing timber does so rinse and wring  
 The ear, it strikes like lightnings to hear him sing;*

Spring is certainly springing and lines such as these from Gerard Manley Hopkins, S.J. describe some of nature's vernal energies. Have you noticed the cherry tree in full bloom beside the church? This Saturday, our parish gardeners were at it again busily preparing our gardens for the new season's blossoms. Be sure to check out our renovated area in the Chapel Garden.

Besides nature's change of seasons we have reached a new stage in our parish's Season of Discernment. Since last June, when the news about Cardinal McCarrick's abhorrent behaviors was first reported, our Parish Pastoral Council, parish staff and a host of other parishioners have engaged in a Season of Discernment. This season has been marked by a prayerful collaboration of ways for parishioners to voice their anger and sadness about the Roman Catholic Church as well as express ways to repair and to reform it locally and globally. Building on these efforts the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is having a meeting today from 2-4pm in Trinity Hall in which we will discuss what we have done, what we are doing and what new initiatives are possible. In effect, the meeting may be viewed as preparing our Second Season of Discernment. All are welcome and encouraged to join the process, even if you were unable to attend earlier meetings.

In anticipation of this important meeting, allow me to briefly review some recent Season of Discernment programs. Last weekend the parish co-sponsored a dialogue and panel discussion with Fr. Hans Zollner, S.J., president of the Centre for Child Protection (CCP) at the Gregorian University. A recording of the dialogue may be viewed at [www.trinity.org/zollner](http://www.trinity.org/zollner). We also hosted Dr. Phyllis Zagano, a member of the papal commission on woman deacons. All of these programs served as ways in which the parish is confronting some of the neuralgic issues facing the Church.

With the imminent announcement of our new Archbishop one finds a greater hope for healing and hopefully the beginning of a new phase of responding to the clergy abuse scandal. Members of the PPC have already drafted a letter to the new Archbishop welcoming him to the Archdiocese, inviting him to visit Holy Trinity in the near future and to learn about the fruits of our Season of Discernment. Through the amazing parishioner engagement of time, talent and treasure Holy Trinity may promote within and beyond our parish a spring-like hope for the repair, renewal and reform of the Roman Catholic Church.

## HOLY WEEK LITURGY SCHEDULE

### Palm Sunday, April 14

**Regular Mass Schedule.** All Masses except 7:30 & 9am will begin in Trinity Hall for the Palm Procession. Please arrive immediately to the Hall on Palm Sunday.

### Holy Wednesday, April 17

**Parish Penance Service, 7pm, Church.** After a short Liturgy of the Word, priests will be available for individual confessions.

### Holy Thursday, April 18

**Morning Prayer, 8am, Church.** Prayerfully enter Triduum with the psalms and songs of Holy Week. A small breakfast will follow.

**Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, 8pm, Church.** Begin Triduum with the Washing of Feet, the Celebration of the Eucharist, and the transfer of the Blessed Sacrament.

**Stations of the Cross, 4pm, Church.** Pray the traditional Stations of the Cross in a new way by following the way of Jesus from his sentencing to his crucifixion.

**Commemoration of the Lord's Passion, 8pm, Church.** On Good Friday night, the Triduum celebration continues with the formal commemoration of Jesus' Passion with the reading of the Passion Gospel, the Veneration of the Cross, and reception of Holy Communion reserved from Thursday night's celebration

### Holy Saturday, April 20

**Morning Prayer, 8am, Church.** Pray with those who be baptized at the Easter Vigil as they recite the Creed for the first time. The church will be decorated after Morning Prayer.

**Easter Vigil, 8pm, McKenna Courtyard.** The holiest of nights in the Christian calendar begins with a bonfire and service of light in McKenna Courtyard. We'll process through the streets of Georgetown in a candlelight procession as we re-enter the church to hear the story of creation and redemption, baptize and confirm new Catholics, and celebrate Easter Eucharist.



### Qualified Charitable Distribution

**CLARIFICATION** to last week's article. The April 1 deadline to make a required minimum distribution, including a qualified charitable distribution, from a traditional IRA or 401(k) applies only those who turned 70.5 the year preceding. These individuals, having reach the requisite age, must begin distributions by April 1 of the year after they turned 70.5. Thereafter the deadline is 12/31 to take that year's distributions. “Probably the best moment, although this sounds odd, was saying goodbye to everyone on Sunday morning,” said Daniel. “The reason I say this is by that time I had gotten to know a number of people who I knew I would be seeing in the future and who had already been so welcoming and friendly, in a really genuine way. So really it was more of a ‘see you later, I'm happy we met more than just goodbye.’”
