Arriving Where We Started By Rev. Paul Brian Campbell, S.J.

In "The Little Gidding," the last of T. S. Eliot's "Four Quartets," we read:

We shall not cease from exploration And the end of all our exploring Will be to arrive where we started And know the place for the first time.

I've been thinking a lot about these lines in the context of the repairs we've been making to our church this summer. We've had to leave it to "explore" having Sunday Masses either in our own Trinity Hall or in the quiet splendor of Georgetown University's Dahlgren Chapel.

Sometimes Trinity Hall has been too warm, other times too cool (for some, but never for me...), but at least it was "home turf." I've only presided at Mass in Dahlgren Chapel twice this summer but, hospitable as the university has been and lovely as it is, it didn't feel like home. I had the faint impression of visiting a distant relative's home.

Living Our Mission: Accompany One Another in Christ

This week's column is written Judith Brusseau, Pastoral Associate for Religious Education

What does a Church open to LGBTQIA+ Catholics look like? Holy Trinity's commitment to accompany one another in Christ invites us to be more deeply aware of the diversity of our community and more welcoming to those who are marginalized by society or the Church. This raises the question of how our parish can be more embracing of individuals who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, questioning/queer, intersex, asexual, as well as others on the gender and sexuality spectrum and their families and friends.

Recent articles in America magazine and the National Catholic Reporter have highlighted and energized the discussion of the people of God as our faith community ponders the call for a deeper openness to all LGBTQIA+ Catholics—a recognition of their presence, gifts and talents.

"You belong to the heart of this Church," said Archbishop Gregory to LGBTQIA+ Catholics at a Theology on Tap event this summer, "And there is nothing that you may do, may say, that will ever rip you from the heart of this Church. There is a lot that has been said to you, about you, behind your back, that is painful and is sinful...We have to find a way to talk to one another. And to talk to one another, not just from one perspective, but to talk and to listen to one another. I think that's the way that Jesus ministered. He engaged people, He took them where they were at, and He invited them to go deeper, closer to God."

Pastor Kevin Gillespie, S.J., as well as our Jesuit priests, staff and Parish Pastoral Council support a lay-led LGBTQIA+ ministry as a part of fostering a vision of a more welcoming Church. Interested parishioners have begun exploring what other Jesuit parishes are doing and discussing how to adapt those helpful models to Holy Trinity.

For the past six months, interested parishioners have thoughtfully explored what we are being invited to do. The fruit of their thoughtful process is a Day of Reflection for LGBTQIA+ individuals, friends, and family.

Along with prayer and reflection, the afternoon will include a discussion about activities and events to make the LGBTQIA+community's needs and gifts more present in our community. The LGBTQIA+ ministry will gather the graces and resources of the Day of Reflection and make them available through future programming, this bulletin, and the Holy Trinity website and eLetter.

The Day of Reflection will be held in McKenna Hall on Saturday, **September 14**. Hospitality begins at 12:30pm, and the Day of Reflection begins at 1pm. All are invited to celebrate at the 5:30pm Liturgy in Trinity Hall afterward.



and renovated church and we'll "arrive where we started/And know the place for the first time." What you'll first notice, I expect, will be the color of the walls. With fresh paint and new, brighter LED lighting, It looks crisp and clean to my eyes.

Michael Gick, chair of the ad hoc committee for the church repairs, writes, "While the colors are deeper and more contrasting, the basic wall color is specifically tied to the previous colors. Differences due to age and oxidation were taken into account in choosing the hues. Choices of color location highlight the stained glass frames more prominently than before."

A major revelation of these repairs has been the Stations of the Cross. Charma Edmonds, the restorer, spent hour upon hour scraping away layers of paint and discovered that they were wood-carved, and had originally covered in gold leaf and over time painted white. It was decided to keep them white, but you will now be able to see much more detail in them. For me, it's as if fuzzy photos have now come sharply into focus.

There are new pews, flooring, climate control, and better lighting. As I'm writing this, the new sound system has yet to be installed, but, as Michael Gick writes, it will be "greatly improved with both the audio equipment—including presider, ambo and lectern microphones, and speaker arrays designed to reach to the far reaches of the worship space." (By the way, did you know that the globes at the bottom of our chandeliers have speakers in them? Sadly, they stopped working long ago.) Additionally, a new Wi-Fi system will allow the hearing impaired to connect directly to our audio feed using a smartphone and personal earphones.

Returning to the familiar routines of the church will be a great comfort. The church has been renewed and refreshed. What about us? Are we returning renewed and refreshed? The church is now ready to serve us for many years to come. In what ways are we ready to serve?



Stewardship Update

Holy Trinity's fiscal year is from July 1 to June 30. The chart below shows a precipitous decline this past fiscal year in the number of households offering a financial pledge commitment—a drop of 23%. **This is a critical trend that must be reversed as we begin the 2020 pledge drive this autumn**. No institution can sustain the loss of a quarter of its financial supporters and remain financially healthy. If this trend is not reversed, Holy Trinity's ministries, along with our community and our staff, will suffer.

The drop in the number of pledging households has resulted in a loss of actual pledge income of around 12%. This is less than the drop in pledging households because the amount of money being given by those who continued to pledge rose 22%—to an average of nearly \$2,400 per household. This means that fewer households were giving more money to sustain Holy Trinity's worship and sacramental life, our multiple ministries, and the staff and facilities that support our mission.



Nevertheless, the loss in our pledging households is not sustainable. We recognize that the ongoing scandal of clergy sexual abuse has had an impact, and we have worked tirelessly in collaboration with parishioners and outside groups to address specific areas of concern and take action. Our local mission and the many thousands of people blessed weekly by our worship and ministries—here in Georgetown, throughout DC and around the globe—depend on those who offer their money to sustain the work of Jesus Christ in our midst.

If you have not pledged for 2019, we request your support—2019 pledges can be received through December. If you have pledged this year, we thank you with deep appreciation.

And for all our parish households—everyone who worships with us occasionally or regularly—we respectfully ask you to support Holy Trinity by making a 2020 pledge when we ask later this fall. Thank you.
