Our Historic Church Reopens

The Ad Hoc Committee enthusiastically welcomes you to our rehabilitated historic 1854 worship space. We invite you to notice the following:

- The overall liturgical atmosphere has been refreshed with great attention to color and lighting. While the colors are deeper and more contrasting, the basic all color is specifically tied to previous colors. Differences due to age and oxidation were taken into account in choosing the hues. Choice of color location highlight the stained glass frames more prominently than before.
- Acoustics, environmental temperature and humidity, sacred art as well as some new finishes and provisions for the handicapped.
- The heating and air conditioning system is new and

Interior Changes to the Church

Did you know that interior of the church has changed dramatically over the past 165 years? The original galleries along the side walls, where slaves once attended Mass, were removed between 1881 and 1890. After 1890, stained glass windows were installed. Niches, statues, Stations of the Cross, and side altars were added.

The interior was further changed in 1900, 1945, 1963 and 1979 as parishioners remodeled “in conformity with contemporary tastes.”

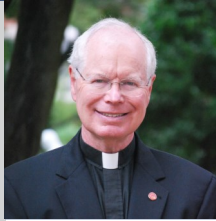

From the Pastor's Desk

When I arrived at Holy Trinity four years ago, one of the features that impressed me was a sense of the parish's potential. At the time when the parish and school Capital Campaign, "Building on Tradition," was nearing completion (eventually raising more than \$12.5 million), one had the sense that resources were available to fund not only programs in Ignatian Spirituality and Social Ministries, but also improvements in the church and the schools facilities.

And so, just as I arrived, there had been in the school the transformation of its auditorium into Trinity Hall, as well as the addition and enhancement of school classrooms and labs under Fr. Mark Horak's leadership. Meanwhile in the church during my first two years, there was the repair and refurbishing of the church's beautiful windows. Last in the campaign's lineup was the repair of the church. This weekend, after two years of meetings and careful planning and 15 weeks of assiduous labor within the closed ecclesiastical edifice, we have completed the Campaign's final project.

As you will read in the cover story of this bulletin, quite a lot has been done. I hope that you find the new environment aesthetically appealing and creatively conducive for prayer and worship. I am certainly looking forward to presiding there knowing that the acoustics have been upgraded, the lighting enhanced and the HVAC systems improved. The mahogany pews and matching sidewall counters, combined with the new rug and polished marble floors will serve to enrich the colorful rays of sunlight from the translucent windows. The confessionals have new doors with translucent windows placed there in accordance with best practices for a safe environment. The statue of the Blessed Mother and the Stations of the Cross have been cleaned and restored. (The latter, I should note, was one of the discoveries of the project as Charma Edmonds—who spent at least five hours on each station—remarked from her experience that each of the wooden station is an impressive work of art. A careful study of each, especially of the delicately crafted hands of Christ does indeed inspire contemplation.)

My hope is that the overall effect of the church's repair and improvements may lead the worshiper into meditative states of awe and wonder.

I would be remiss if I did not extend my heartfelt thanks to the following parishioners and staff who spent long hours helping to make it happen. They are: Michael Gick and Richard Podulka, who each chaired the group; Dino Campagnari, Mathilda Cox, Lisa Dittmeier, Helene Flanagan, Chris Hannigan, Charlie Hennessy, Joseph Luca, David Pennington and Barbara Zientek.

I am also grateful to the Campus Ministry of Georgetown University for allowing us to use Dahlgren Chapel this summer.

Last but not least, I am grateful to the parishioners who not only donated to the Campaign so generously, but also patiently spent the summer worshipping away from our Church. It is good to be back home again, isn't it?

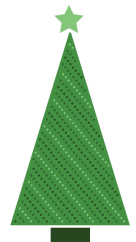
Landings Ministry

state of the art. The high efficiency equipment will save on energy and the controls will allow for a very comfortable spaces — summer and winter.

- The lighting is greatly improved in terms of color rendering of interior finishes. Again, energy efficient LED lamps save on power and burn cooler than incandescent lamps. The lighting density is improved for congregational reading as well as focused on liturgical action. Additional light fixtures have been added over the pews for better light and reading.
- The sound system is greatly improved with both the audio equipment—including celebrant, ambo and lectern microphones, and speaker arrays designed to reach to the far corners of the worship space. For the hearing impaired, we have a Wi-Fi system that can be accessed using your smart phone and personal earphones. Instructions will be printed in the bulletin as it becomes functional.
- Our pews are new and more comfortable while maintaining the character and color of our former seating. You may note that the pews were installed to allow more room at the foot of the sanctuary that allows easier communion flow. Balcony pews and stairs were arranged for safer movement.
- Doors to the church have been configured with ADA push plate automatic operators to ease the movement at the rear left door.
- Please note that the Stations of the Cross have been completely restored. Originally wood carvings, they have been stripped of years of unflattering paint accumulation and painstakingly returned to their former glory. Please look closely as many details formerly lost are now visible.
- New doors and windows have been added to the confessional rooms.
- New carpet has been installed, the marble floors have been polished, and the Blessed Mother statue has also been cleaned.

It is the belief of the Ad Hoc Committee that the parish has benefited immensely by the efforts of so many participants including the contractors, the project managers, the consultants, and indeed a host of dedicated Holy Trinity staff. We thank them all.▪

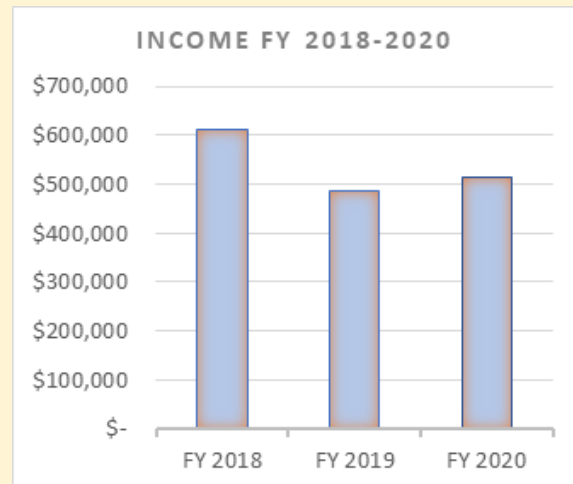

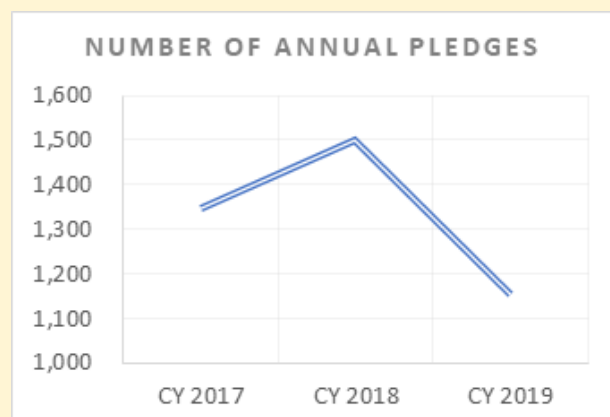

Stewardship Update

The generosity and commitment of Holy Trinity's parishioners make it possible for us to live out our Jesuit mission. While our overall pledge income in this **Calendar** Year remains behind 2018, the first two months of the new **Fiscal** Year (which began 7/1) are positive - reflecting a good response to our call for parishioners to keep up their pledges over this summer when the Church was closed for repairs.



However, throughout 2019 the number of households offering a pledge has remained about 23% below 2018. We recognize the scandal of abusive clergy may have an impact. However, our local mission depends on you and we hope to reverse this trend as we launch our 2020 pledge drive later this year.
