PPC Priorities for 2019-2020 By Christopher Hannigan

In September, Holy Trinity's Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) identified two priorities for the 2019-2020 term: 1) Graduating the parish's response to the Church's sexual abuse scandal to a new phase that is both sustainable for the long term and institutionalized into our governance and planning processes, and 2) Examining how Holy Trinity can best respond to the Universal Apostolic Preferences that will guide the Society of Jesus for the next 10 years. Both of these efforts directly support the PPC's mandate of assuring fidelity to our Catholic mission and Jesuit identity.

Last summer, Holy Trinity embarked on a "Season of Discernment" in which we employed the tools of Ignatian spirituality to guide our collective response to the Church's sexual abuse scandal. Through listening sessions, dialogue with survivors, intensive research, and group and individual prayer, the PPC organized an initiative, later dubbed "Next Steps," to support education, advocacy, service, and prayer that responded to the crisis.

The parish's response was immediate, and our initiative was necessarily dynamic. Today, these labors and those of other advocates have already borne first fruits, but true reform is a generational undertaking. To this end, the PPC has prioritized making this work self-sustaining and, therefore, enduring, despite finite resources. Among our first steps are conducting a parish-wide assessment of our progress, reorganizing to promote collaboration among reform advocates, and further networking with similar efforts in other parishes and organizations.

New to this year's PPC is an examination of how Holy Trinity can best respond to the four Universal Apostolic Preferences articulated by Superior General Arturo Sosa, S.J., earlier this year: to show the way to God through the Spiritual Exercises and discernment; to walk with the

poor, the outcasts of the world, those whose dignity has been violated, in a mission of reconciliation and justice; to accompany young people in the creation of a hopefilled future; and to collaborate in the care of our common home.

Offered to guide the work of the Jesuits and Jesuit institutions around the world, these preferences are not "priorities" to the exclusion of other important, and sometimes urgent, labors. Over a 10-year period, we must be prepared that God will call us to new and unanticipated missions. Still, the 16-month global discernment that brought forth these preferences represents an attempt to seek the *magis*—that is, among many "goods," seeking the greater good for the glory of God. In coming months, PPC meetings will feature dialogues with experts, staff, and other parish leaders about these four preferences. Informed by fact-based research and prayerful discernment, we will seek how Holy Trinity can better respond to these preferences and communicate our findings to the broader parish.

All parishioners are welcome to join us in both of these projects. The next PPC meeting will be **November 20** at 7pm in McKenna Hall, and interested parishioners can always communicate with your elected leadership at *parishcouncil@trinity.org* or *ppcpresident@trinity.org*.

Living Our Mission: Accompany One Another in Christ

This week's column is written by Ronnate Asirwatham, Pastoral Associate for Social Justice

"Why Holy Trinity?" parishioners ask me.

I spent most of my life in a war-torn country. In Sri Lanka, my faith in God was reaffirmed every day because of the Church's relentless fight for justice. Catholic priests and nuns would speak truth to power. They protected civilians in imminent danger of being murdered by the government's military or abducted by rebels. In fact, a Jesuit from Louisiana, Fr. Eugene Herbert SJ, was forcibly disappeared in 1990 for his tireless work on human rights.

It was from such an environment I was transplanted to the U.S. Here I witnessed faith in God in the congregations I was part of prior to Holy Trinity, but there was little of a faith that does justice. Here was a God I scarcely recognized nor understood. It was only after a long search that I found Holy Trinity where faith also meant commitment to justice. It helped me find my God again.

So, that's my answer to parishioners who ask, "Why Holy Trinity?" And I am not alone. As a parishioner for the last 7 years, many have told me they are proud to call themselves Holy Trinity parishioners because of its commitment to justice, both from the pulpit and in the community.

Why is a faith that does justice important? The answer is embedded in the Universal Apostolic Preferences (UAPs) released in February, especially in the two of the four UAPs that push for justice: walking with the poor and those whose dignity has been violated in a mission of reconciliation and justice, and collaborating in the care of our common home.

To work towards a faith that does justice, we have to do more than charity. As Sister Helen Prejean in a recent talk about her new book said, "It is not enough to be giving charity to the few around us; we need to find the fire within." But the fire within, for what? Superior General of the Society of Jesus, Arturo Sosa, S.J., writes in his letter detailing the UAPs: "[T]he path we seek to follow with the poor is one that promotes social justice and change of economic, political structures that generate injustice; this path is a necessary dimension of the reconciliation of individuals, peoples and their cultures with one another with natures and with God."

The UAPs also emphasize that in order to ensure that our faith is focused on justice, we must work in community. One cannot ensure social justice that changes unjust structures or care for common home without having a community coming together to take action.

At Holy Trinity, through our Green Team, our sister parishes in Haiti and El Salvador, and our work with the homeless and migrants in U.S., we strive for change. However, the need to work against unjust structures here in the U.S and abroad has become even more urgent today. So, I hope you will join me in prayer and action that we at Holy Trinity will find the fire within us to come together and widen our community to "set the world on fire" for justice.

Daily Mass Intentions

Plant Trees

They clean our air, protect our drinking water, provide food and habitat for animals. Studies show they even improve our mental health. Trees also absorb the CO2 that contributes to global warming and release oxygen back into the air. In one year, an acre of mature trees absorbs the amount of CO² produced by a car driven 26,000 miles. Planting trees also helps prevent soil erosion, increases land fertility and can add value to your property. Trees that provide shade can also significantly reduce your energy bills.
