"I Pray with Mommy": Using Imaginative Prayer at Home

I lit a candle. We all piled on the bed, our boat, as "a great windstorm arose..." My 2year-old held on tight and my 5-year-old hauled buckets of water out of the boat as I narrated the scene from Mark 4:35-41. My kids dove into the story with their vast imaginations. As I described the storm to them, my kids hopped from side to side like they were blowing in the wind. I drew their attention to Jesus. "He was in the stern, asleep on the cushion..." My children marveled at the fact that Jesus was actually sleeping. Then, "Jesus woke up and rebuffed the wind and said to the sea, 'Peace. Be still." Stillness lingered in the room and we closed our prayer with an Our Father. We blew out the candle, twice, because each child wanted a turn to blow it out.

I asked my 5-year-old what he liked about the passage and he told me that he was amazed that Jesus talked to the sea. My son's mind was working hard to figure out how that could happen. I was amazed because I wasn't expecting my son to be

teaching me that evening. I never thought about the fact that Jesus had actually talked to the sea. When I entertain this thought, the passage becomes more mystical. I told my children the line that always resonates with me is the one that describes Jesus as asleep during the storm. I reminded them how calm he was, even though the world around him was not. I told them that they can always turn to Jesus for comfort and love when things get stormy in their world. Jesus will help ground them. An anchor.

From the Pastor's Desk

Tis' the season for merriment often found through programs of magnanimity, movies and music. The merriment of music in and around the parish was wonderfully displayed recently when some 20 parishioners of all ages enjoyed walking around Georgetown caroling. And our spiritual serenades were even accompanied by a trumpet! Given that it was our third consecutive year of caroling, it seems that a new parish yuletide tradition has begun.

The season is also a time for religiously themed movies. Top on my list is *The Two Popes*. Outstanding performances by Antony Hopkins (Pope Benedict) and Jonathan Pryce (Cardinal Jorge Bergoglio, the future Pope Francis) provide insight into the personalities of these Church leaders. The movie invites the viewer into venues such as the Sistine Chapel and the papal gardens at Castel Gandolfo. While somewhat fictionalized, the dialogue between the two popes is, nevertheless, inspirational. Indeed, some parishioners have asked about the possibility of having an evening discussion about it sometime in January.

And then there is *The Messiah!* As someone who has for decades relished listening and frequently watching performances of Handel's Messiah, I came upon and highly recommend a PBS special show dealing with the making of Handel's Messiah. The documentary tells the story of the context of George Frideric Handel's life that led to this most famous of oratorios, first performed on April 13, 1742 in Dublin. Among the several revelations is the story of Charles Jennings, who wrote much of the libretti for Handel. One is afforded a deeper meaning into the oratorio with the knowledge that Jennings turned to scriptural passages as a way of coping with the tragedy of his brother's suicide.

Similarly, Handel himself, despite dealing with the desolation of financial misfortune, was led to turn to Jenkins biblical libretto and composed *The Messiah* within 24 days! As the documentary relates, Handel directed that the very first performance in Dublin serve as a charity event. Indeed, the proceeds from the first performance aided several charities, among them a debtor's prison so that more than 140 men and women were released from prison. This PBS special thereby is a historical celebration of how Handel's Messiah, from its very inception, has led humanity to experience a triumphant *Hallelujah*!

One final dimension of merriment was the magnanimity exhibited in the hustle and bustle by parishioners around our parish's annual Giving Tree. I am most grateful for the many parishioners whose generosity provided 1,300 gifts that were distributed to 14 charities throughout the area.

I give thanks to God for the generosity of our parishioners, living out the true Spirit of Christ's birth. And so, on behalf of my brother Jesuits and all members of our parish staff, may you and your loved ones be blessed with merriment during this sacred season and throughout the new year as we experience the magnanimity of God's gift being born through a virgin woman named Mary.

This imaginative form of prayer is new for us as a family. I've used imaginative prayer on my own, but I thought of it as a solitary practice and kept my prayer life quite private. That changed last spring when I participated in the parish's six-week Lenten Retreat in Daily Life. During this retreat, God guided me gently, always gently, to a new way of praying with my children. It began quite simply. While praying during the retreat, I prayed in my 5-year-old's room after he had gone to sleep each night. It was a quiet space and it was comforting for me and hopefully my son as he slept.

Little sneakers
A Mardi Gras crown
A beloved robot
The candle flickers
Spiderman
Big bear
My beautiful son is sleeping
At peace
The clock ticks
Waves roar
And I pray

Halfway through the six-week retreat, I heard a speaker talk about how she was teaching her kids to care for themselves by letting them see how she cares for her own spiritual life. I wondered why I never shared that I was doing a spiritual retreat with my family. I guess I just assumed they wouldn't be interested. That evening, I decided to tell my 5-year-old that I've been participating in a six-week retreat and as part of it, I'd been praying in his room after he has gone to sleep. He asked me if he ever woke up while I was praying and I told him no, but I liked that he was with me, even in his sleep. Next, he surprised me and asked me if, one day, he could be awake while I was praying. Yes, of course!

The next evening, while I was putting my 2-year-old to bed, my 5-year-old had already gathered up my candle, matches, and bible and brought them into his room. For the very first time I prayed using imaginative prayer with my child. When we were finished praying, he blew out the candle and exclaimed, "Mommy! This is so fun! So fun! Mommy, I think we should do this with my little brother, too." My heart burst with pride, surprise and love. I thanked God. The next week at school, he drew a picture. He named it, "I pray with mommy."

A few nights later, we asked my 2-year-old to join us. My littlest one gleefully mimicked what his big brother was doing and it was pure joy. Within one prayer session, my 2-year-old took things into his own hands. If it's a long day and we're all tired, I sometimes try and just put my kids to bed after reading time. But my 2-year-old is persistent. "No! I pray! Come pray! Come pray!" So, we light a candle as he picks up the Bible and my journal. He insists that all four of our family members are present and we pray.

My Mother's Day gift last Spring was a new prayer candle and matches. Thank you, my boys. We pray.

Together we pray!■
