Connections that Strengthen Our Faith

As I sat in church in December, surrounded by all the symbols of Christmas, I looked at those around me and reflected on our many connections. Sitting near me were two of my fellow Homebound Communion Ministers. Scattered through the gathering were those Eucharistic Ministers I join at the altar when scheduled to help distribute Communion. Other individuals I knew from the many years I helped facilitate Grief Support sessions. And I also saw those with whom I had served on the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC). My three-year term on the PPC taught me a great deal about the wide range of programs the parish offers, and the magnificently talented leaders who devote their time to make them successful in broadening our faith.

When I first became a parishioner in 1977, I sat quietly in my pew with my wife and children, not involved in the programs of the parish. That changed in 1991, after the death of my mother and in 1992 when my wife and I divorced. In that period of sadness, I knew I needed help and to step outside my private self. I got involved with the Grief Support Group, where I learned from Bill Hocking and Maureen Leventhal, masters of empathy, compassion and caring, to listen quietly to those who grieved, to provide support and let them know that they were not alone and—in the words of Thornton Wilder—that the greatest gift we can give to those we have loved and lost is “not grief, but gratitude.”

I also joined the Homebound Communion Ministry. As ministers, we not only deliver Communion, but provide companionship and caring; for some of those we see, we may be the only person they see that week. Sharing the insights found in the weekly readings, learning who they are and letting them know that they are thought of and appreciated as part of the parish community, has been a special grace.

Planting Trees in Guadalajara

Parishioner Yolanda Gayol wanted to do something about climate change—so she set her sights on planting trees. Trees are natural weapons against climate change, absorbing carbon dioxide. Trees can also provide shade, help fight flooding in coastal communities and support biodiversity.

Yolanda enlisted her graduate students in Guadalajara, Mexico, to plant 250 trees. She also worked with her students to make sure the trees were cared for. The students connected with neighbors who could check in on the trees; every tree is also photographed and tracked in an effort to identify the trees that are best suited for their environment. The project has not always progressed smoothly, however—one student was nearly arrested for planting a tree in a public park! The university gave him a letter explaining the project in case he was further questioned.

When Yolanda talks to her students about climate change, she frames it as a conversation about “protecting life.” Making a difference will require systematic change, and we all have a part to play. “Examine every action,” she says. “Everyday life matters.” Anyone can make an impact by reducing their consumer footprint, lowering their thermostat, cutting back on meat, or using less plastic. •

Living Our Mission: Accompany One Another in Christ

Looking for a Lenten practice? One suggestion is to pay attention to what will be happening with the adults and children who will be baptized at the Easter Vigil. The Season of Lent invites all of us who are baptized to walk the journey to the font with them and to be ready to welcome them into the Body of Christ.

It will all begin on the First Sunday of Lent with the parish Rite of Sending for Election. During this rite, we as a parish community recognize the catechumens to be baptized at the coming Easter Vigil and assure them of our blessings and prayers as we “send” them to Archbishop Gregory, who will call them to the Easter Sacraments of baptism, confirmation and Eucharist.

From the day of election through the 40 day period of Lent, called the period of purification and enlightenment for the Elect, our Elect are invited into a more intense time of spiritual preparation as they anticipate the Easter sacraments. As Lenten people, we are called to “give the Elect the example of [our] own renewal in the spirit of penance, faith, and charity” (RCIA 9(4)).

The Elect look to us to give authentic witness to living these spiritual disciplines—and not only during Lent. As the baptized assembly who is present for the scrutiny rites celebrated with the elect, those rituals of self-searching and repentance on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent, we pray with the Elect that all that is “weak, defective, or sinful” in their hearts be healed and all that is “upright, strong, and good” within them be strengthened (RCIA 141). This is our responsibility—as the baptized, as people who also know, at times, weakness and sinfulness, and the need to be strengthened.

At the Easter Vigil, when our elect are plunged into the waters of baptism, incorporated into the Body of Christ, the Church, we who are already baptized find meaning in renewing our own baptismal promises (RCIA 9(4)), recommitting ourselves to the faith we profess and embody.

And after the Easter Vigil, our work is not yet done, for we are to “welcome the neophytes (the newly baptized) with open arms in charity, and help them to feel more at home in the community” (RCIA 5). The neophytes are to “experience a full and joyful welcome,” which, in turn, should bring us a “renewal of inspiration and of outlook” (RCIA 246).

We walk with our neophytes throughout the Easter season – and beyond – when we are called to grow together in deepening our understanding of the paschal mystery, making it part of our lives through reflection on the Gospel, sharing the eucharist, and doing the works of charity (RCIA 244).

Please pray for our Elect: Nick, Mayer, Darcy, Lizi, Nancy, Jim, Rich, Tara, Diana, Rory and Hans.

DAILY MASS INTENTIONS

My experience has taught me that community requires effort, to go beyond ourselves, to be tolerant and compassionate and charitable in our dealings with others. Parish Life and its varied activities are part of our Holy Trinity community where we share our needs and build connections that give us faith, grace and strength by accompanying one another through the stages of our lives—becoming men and women of faith for others.

I am profoundly thankful for all that Holy Trinity has given me, and hope that I have been able to give back in some measure for all the grace that I have received from my fellow parishioners. That grace began in an utterly unexpected way when my then wife and I first arrived in Washington in 1977. I chose Holy Trinity because I had gone to Georgetown University and, before that, to Beaumont College, a Jesuit boarding school in Old Windsor, England. My then wife was Lutheran, and wanted to participate as much as possible in church services at Holy Trinity. We met with Fr. Jim English, who could not have been more welcoming to my wife, and who made her always feel comfortable coming to our services. His emphasis was on the common ties that unite us, rather than differences between our faiths.

That meeting and its result has stayed with me over all the intervening years, as a shining example of what makes the Holy Trinity community so very special, each day living up to its mission statement to welcome *all* to accompany one another in Christ, to celebrate God's love, and to transform lives. ▪
