When Hurricane Harvey blew into Houston in 2017, my mother's house was one of the many that were affected. It was four days after the rain stopped before we were finally able to get back into her house to start the cleanup. It was hot, sweaty, back-breaking and emotionally draining work. Like everyone in our neighborhood, we were spending days hauling furniture to the curb, pulling up carpeting and ripping out drywall and insulation.

There was a community spirit in the middle of it all, a sort of shared misery and sense of uncertainty about the future. Yet there were moments of shared grace where we least expected it. One hot afternoon, two cars pulled up to the ruined house next door and started unloading tables and enormous pans of food. They went door to door inviting anyone who wanted lunch to come outside. There was a buffet of chicken, rice and beans and

These were complete strangers; they had no connection to any of us other than the fact they knew we needed lunch. They told me they went to a different street each day and set up lunch for anyone who wanted it—a makeshift picnic assembled in the driveway or on the curb or wherever there was room. Neighbors kept coming, and pans of food kept coming out of the car. It was like a modern-day feeding miracle-all of us, strangers and friends, united around a simple meal given freely out of love.

The Eucharist that we share today is the same-it unites us with Christ and His Church and to one another in sacred and powerful ways. It calls us to the table, and it sends us out into the world to feed others. Perhaps we feed them through an act of compassion, a kind word or the gift of our time or talent in service to the Church.

From the Pastor's Desk

Last weekend, some 200 laypeople and clergy from across the United States assembled for the annual Catholic Partnership Summit titled *From Crisis to Co-Responsibility: Creating A New Culture of Leadership.* Participants included three cardinals, several archbishops, a dozen bishops as well as the papal nuncio, Archbishop Christophe Pierre and Archbishop Charles Scicluna. The latter serves as the point person for Pope Francis on global concerns and responses to the clergy abuse scandal. These ecclesiological leaders were there to listen to the lay leaders. Besides the latest developments around the clergy abuse scandal, the sessions also included such concerns as transparency, synodality, and succession planning. These panel sessions were followed by small group discussions.

One important discussion involved facing the realities of the ongoing loss of disaffiliative Catholics. These concerns were addressed through the book and video titled, Going, Going, Gone: The Dynamics of Disaffiliation in Young Catholics. This qualitative study is a statistically sound sample of the 5.4 million individuals in the United States who are former Catholics between the ages of 15 and 25. The study led to three categories of disaffiliated Catholics: "The Injured," "The Drifter," and "The Dissenter." The Injured are those who have had negative experiences of Catholic religious and ritual practices whether ecclesial or familial. Drifters, meanwhile, are persons who have had little or no engagement with their faith-this often occurs when they lack companions on their spiritual journey (e.g. in high school and college). Finally, Dissenters actively disaffiliate from the Church over certain neuralgic social issues (e.g. abortion, contraception and same-sex marriage).

This important summit also dealt with issues surrounding governance, transparency and stewardship. Best practices of accountability and internal controls of parish finances were highlighted. In this respect, I am happy to report that Holy Trinity has an annual audit process. Indeed this past month our auditors at Handwerger, Cardegna, Funkhouser & Lurman, in investigating our parish's and school's management and internal controls, found "no significant difficulties."

Finally, the conference addressed concerns surrounding young adults defined as men and women between the ages of 18-39. Strategies of "succession planning" were offered. One pertinent question that continues to reverberate in my mind: "How many names of young adults do you know in your parish?" Remember— their generation will be the next cohort of faith leaders. Upon leaving this important two day summit, I had the recognition that there are many concerns that need to be addressed and remedied, but I also had a feeling of hope for the future of the Catholic Church in the United States. Every week we hear in the Eucharistic prayer, "This is my body...this is my blood...*which is given for you.*"

The miracle of feeding the 5,000 appears in all four Gospels. In the gospel of Mark, Jesus tells his disciples, "Give them some food yourselves..." (*Mark 6:37*) I have to think Jesus already knew what He was going to do and yet, He still asks this of them. In John's Gospel, Jesus asks his disciples bluntly, "Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?" (John 6:5) Where can we buy enough..? The "we" seems like a key part of this solution.

It may seem overwhelming to be Christ today in the world, but Jesus reminds us that we are not alone in this quest. He is, will be, and always has been part of this work—which is His, after all. *We* are doing this work, with the help of Jesus, present and real for us in the Sacrament of the Eucharist."
