

The Development of Black Catholic Parishes in the Washington Area by Bernard A. Cook

In February 1924 an appeal for Black missions in the United States was sent by bishops to Holy Trinity. It stated, "The bishops of the country... find that the Colored people in particular do not feel at home in White churches, or they think themselves treated coldly, only tolerated, and in some instances openly snubbed. There are exceptions in some of the more robust Catholic centers of the North and South, but this is fast becoming the prevailing opinion." Before this appeal was read at Holy Trinity someone crossed out everything after "treated coldly." Holy Trinity parishioners contributed \$119.65.

The previous year 357 Black adults and nearly 300 children offended by the demeaning treatment, which they experienced at Holy Trinity had left Trinity and with the approval of the bishop established their own church in Georgetown, Epiphany. The experience of these Black Catholics was not unique.

The exodus of Black Catholics from Holy Trinity was not the first or last time African Americans offended by the fact that the Black Catholic, not treated as equal members of the Body of Christ, withdrew from a number of Washington area Catholic Churches and founded their own Catholic parishes where they could worship without being subjected to demeaning treatment.

In 1858, free Black Catholics repelled by the racism they experienced at St. Matthew's, where they were forced to attend Mass in the basement, founded Martin de Porres, eventually re-organized as St. Augustine's, the first Black Catholic parish in the District of Columbia.

Across the Potomac in Alexandria, Fr. Francis Neale, S.J., the founding pastor of Holy Trinity, founded and served as pastor of St. Mary's. The treatment of Black Catholics there mirrored their treatment at Holy Trinity. During the Jim Crow era they were subjected to even more demeaning treatment. They were required to attend a separate Mass in the church's alcove. Marriages of Black Catholics were not permitted in the church building. A visiting Josephite priest consecrated marriages of Black faithful in private homes. Finally in 1912, as Trinity's Black faithful would do in 1923, St. Mary's Black Catholics founded their own church, St. Joseph's.

The founding of Black Catholic parishes in the Washington area was particularly pronounced in the 1920s. However, as late as 1947 a Catholic church, Our Lady Queen of Peace, was established in Arlington for Black Catholics. An early member of the parish said, "Sacraments for Black people were not readily available in the White Virginia parishes. St. Charles parish in North Arlington was noted for possibly giving communion to African Americans at Mass." [3] Fared with this scandalous impediment to the practice of their Faith, sixteen Black Catholics requested permission from Bishop

ACCOMPANY ONE ANOTHER IN CHRIST

Dear friends,

Fr. Gillespie has graciously asked me to say a word of introduction as I join the pastoral team of Holy Trinity Parish for the next four months. I am truly grateful to him and to the entire parish for the gift of your hospitality and welcome! It is a grace to be here and serve.

I am a Jesuit priest of our western Province (UWE). I completed my theological studies prior to ordination at the Jesuit School of Theology (JST) at Berkeley and my doctoral studies in ethics at Yale University. For thirty years, I taught social ethics at JST and served as a visiting professor of Hekima University College in Nairobi, Kenya. While teaching and directing our Licentiate (STL) program, I likewise served as the Catholic chaplain with migrant women at the Federal Woman's Prison in Dublin, CA.

Prior to my graduate studies, I worked with Mother Teresa's sisters in the period of formation we call "regency" in Tanzania where I was responsible for some 25 young refugees from Burundi. After completing my tenure at the Jesuit School of Theology in 2019, I began work once again in Eastern Africa with our Jesuit Refugee Service in the Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya. Kakuma, not far from the South Sudanese border, is now home to a quarter million refugees from 20 different countries.

Again and again, I am humbled by the deep faith and resilience of the refugees I was privileged to serve. Their solidarity inspired me to write two books in the last few years: Catholic Social Teaching: A User's Guide (Orbis, 2021) and Reimagining Human Rights: Religion and the Common Good (Georgetown, 2021). I've also written on such topics as race and mass incarceration, ethics and ecology, social reconciliation, and the Church in the public square. I hope to resume my work with our Jesuit Refugee Service in January, in a new role supporting our renewed "mission and identity."

Let me conclude with the words of Charite Lobo, a refugee and now friend from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, who taught me something of hope: "Father, there is no need to be anxious. You fear because of uncertainties. We as refugees experienced these uncertainties from the moment we started running away from our countries. When we took the first step from our lands, we did not know the future. Those were dark uncertain moments. We lost everything, but God saved us, so still we are living. We do not know the future, but we know that God will care for us. Even when we die; we die with God who loves and cares for us."

DAILY MASS INTENTIONS

The parish community prays for all of the dead every day at Mass. However, we encourage parishioners to mention specific persons by name during the General Intercessions when invited to do so by the presider.

Peter Ireton of the Richmond Diocese to establish their own church in Green Valley, then a predominantly Black section of Arlington.

Perhaps priests and parishioners at these churches, that discriminated against their Black brothers and sisters, were oblivious to the structural evils of slavery, segregation, and racism and the moral failure involved in participating in these structural evils, but they did participate in them.

Thomas Merton reacted to practices in the Diocese of Alexandria in Louisiana, where Black Catholics could not



attend White churches in areas that had a Catholic church for Black Catholics. If there was no Black Catholic Church, African Americans who attended the White church had to sit in a segregated section of the church and only receive Communion after all the White parishioners had first received the Eucharist. This was a practice that existed at Holy Trinity until the establishment of Epiphany in 1923. For Merton, "the sacrament of love," that should have bound the faithful together had been transformed into a manifestation of division and bigotry, "the ultimate blasphemy." \$\frac{1}{2}\$




