Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Making a Positive, Radical, and Lasting Difference in People's Lives

Parishioner David Christian is writing an informal autobiography for his children and grandchildren (it works like this: they ask him questions, and he answers them). He recently shared this chapter with the Migrant Familia.

"What is one of your most meaningful volunteer activities?" I like helping immigrants start their new lives in this country. For one thing, the majority of those in the U.S. are descended from immigrants—in my case, from Ireland, England, and France. But far more than that, the work gives me joy and a sense of meaning in this part of my life: it makes a positive, radical, and lasting difference in people's lives.

Here's how I got involved. In 2015 and 2016, I made short trips to El Salvador, a tiny country in Central America, to meet people in our church's sister parish there. Our group not only met people in the parish—we visited their homes. I got to meet Jorge, the student that Arlene and I were helping by paying his school expenses each year. I visited his family's house, which was tiny, with a tin roof and a dirt floor. I met Jorge, his parents, and his sister. The four of them lived in that tiny house. They looked hungry. Their neighborhood was virtually ruled by violent gangs.

Their parish gave them solidarity and a measure of hope, but it couldn't feed, clothe, and house them.

That was my first close-up exposure to extreme poverty and fear, and it was life-changing. I could understand why so many people from situations like that wanted to come to the U.S. for safety and a path out of poverty.

When I got back home, I started a Spanish conversation group to improve my language skills. A little bit of Spanish goes a long way. The group lasted for five years and helped me a lot, though I am not fluent. I told my Spanish group about Jorge and got their help with some of my letters to him.

In November 2018, our son Colin and I joined another delegation from Holy Trinity for an immersion visit to the border between the U.S. and Mexico. It was a natural follow-on to my trips to El Salvador. At the twin towns of Nogales, Arizona and Nogales, Sonora, we met a lot of desperate people from Mexico and Central America trying to come into the U.S. We also met some really good people, Americans and Mexicans, who were serving the immigrants as they arrived at the border exhausted, traumatized, and frightened. All this was eye-opening. I was deeply impressed by their dedication to this work.

Our hosts in Nogales, an awesome group called the Kino Border Initiative (KBI), told us that our real work would start when we got back to Washington and saw the immigrants around us with fresh eyes. One of them suggested that we contact a young man from Honduras, which is right next to El Salvador, to see how he was doing. This young man, Fredys Sevilla, had left his home, his parents, his children, and other

relatives because some vicious gang members threatened to kill him if he wouldn't join the gang. Fredys had managed to survive the long and dangerous journey to Nogales, the KBI had helped him attain asylum, and he was now living close to us near Falls Church, Virginia.



Colin and I took Fredys out to lunch and got to know him. He spoke almost no English, so our little bit of Spanish helped a lot. He had a sister living near Falls Church. Before long, a brother, his partner, and four sons arrived from Honduras to join Fredys and his sister. Fredys needed help to get a job, pay rent, get a Green Card, learn English, find health care, legally drive, and start on the road to self-sufficiency and citizenship. His siblings needed all that and more, including immigration lawyers, help getting the kids into schools, etc. It seemed like an impossible task.

Fortunately, people from Holy Trinity soon formed a Migrant Support Team to help immigrants in our region. Together we learned how to assist with their most pressing needs, and soon we were able to really help Fredys, his family, and many others. In addition, our team aims to befriend them and to accompany them almost like family members.

Since 2018, our team has welcomed, assisted, and befriended immigrants from Honduras, Nicaragua, Haiti, Sudan, Afghanistan, Congo, Gabon, Cameroon, and Ukraine. We are part of their lives, and they are part of our lives. We have shared the joy of their successes and the desolation of their setbacks. We have learned a lot and seen how difficult it can be

for immigrants. We have made enduring friendships with our fellow team members, and benefitted from inspired leadership. The power of the team as a positive force is phenomenal. Together we are doing things that none of us could have done alone. I'm proud of our parish for embracing and supporting this work, which is always a work in progress.

I get special joy from celebrating weddings of our migrant friends. Members of our team have in effect stood in for absent family members back in Honduras and Cameroon; a third such wedding is coming up in a few months and I plan to attend that one too.

In the nearly five years since Colin and I met him, I've mentored Fredys and become a proxy great-uncle for him as he has moved toward independence. His life isn't easy and he still has many ambitious goals to achieve. As I get older, I hope I can look to the migrant team for younger volunteers to accompany Fredys.

Also, back in El Salvador, where this particular journey of mine got its start, Jorge has graduated from high school, and Arlene and I now have a six-year-old student to sponsor: his name is Jared. I hope to make another trip there, this time with Colin, to meet Jared and David Isaac, a contemporary of Jared's whom Colin's family is sponsoring. The jury is still out on that dream.

I hope that our grand-daughters, Kyra, Lydia, and Julianne, will experience the joy of learning other languages and making friends from other countries. And that they will find the joy of being part of faith-based teams that help people in need.
