More Voices From Our Sister Parish, St. Jean Baptiste in Ansdano, Haiti

*The second in a series of interviews –
this week, with Judy Keating*

When did you get involved in Holy Trinity's St. Jean Baptiste Haiti Committee?

I have been involved with the Haiti Committee for 10 years. Initially, I responded to a bulletin announcement regarding a parish trip to Haiti in 2013. I had several conversations with Kittie Fitzgerald, who was organizing the trip. I got the sense that the trip would be well organized and productive. This would be my first of four trips. Through Maryknoll, I did two brief stints teaching English in China and Thailand. I had considered doing another stint in Asia, when the opportunity to go to Haiti presented itself. The fact that Haiti was closer to home, and I knew a little French, meant that it would be more convenient and easier to communicate.

Tell us about a memorable experience on one of your trips.

On my 2013 trip, we facilitated many weddings that were held at our sister parish, St. Jean Baptiste and surrounding chapels. Haitian couples often forgo a wedding because of the expense. Pere thought it was important to offer the parishioners a chance for a marriage ceremony. He



asked our committee to bring wedding dresses, veils, and even wedding bands. Our committee collected more than 35 dresses and we hand sewed many veils. All were carried to Haiti in our luggage!! A lasting memory is of an older couple who after their wedding hopped onto a motorcycle and took off, wedding veil flowing in the breeze. During this extraordinary experience, I think we all developed a closer bond with our Haitian friends.

Were you able to connect with any one person in a particular situation?

When we were staging the individual weddings, we brought the dresses to a large room where each woman could select a dress and try it on. There were about 20 or more brides anxiously trying to find the perfect dress. It was chaotic! There were disagreements as the women occasionally competed for the same dress. I found myself refereeing one such argument between two brides. I tried to convince one woman that the dress wouldn't fit her, but she was adamant. She had to have THAT dress! And in the end, she prevailed. Right then and there she put on the dress and amazingly it fit her perfectly...as if it had been made for her.

At what point during any of your trips to Haiti did you ask yourself, What have I gotten myself into?

There were several misadventures over the four trips that I made. One that comes to mind was when our group was returning to Port-au-Prince at the end of our visit. The roads were under constant construction and repair and the workers were not always paid. To protest this injustice, the workers would stop traffic simply by digging a trench across the main road. Our trip was interrupted by a 4-foot-deep trench cut across the road. We had to carry our luggage from Pere Medard's car, across the trench, and then meet another local priest on the other side of the trench, who drove us the rest of the way.

What was it like not having running water, and limited access to electricity? How did you sleep?

Regarding water and electricity, I have experienced this in other travels, and I am flexible, so it was not difficult to adjust. We also knew that the locals had it much rougher than we did. I slept better in Haiti than at home. I was so focused, and in the moment, it was calming. Also, I was usually tired at the end of our full, active days. But I did have trouble with the loud crowing of roosters in the early mornings.

Did you have a moment when your connection transcended a language barrier?

Following on the wedding dress story, I felt badly about

the argument and for discouraging the young woman from insisting on a particular dress. I apologized and though we couldn't understand each other's words, it was clear that all was forgiven. She was, of course, happy to have her beautiful gown.

How are you able to stay connected to Haiti and our sister parish these past years when gang violence has kept us from visiting?

Primarily through our Haiti Committee. I regularly buy Just Haiti Coffee, sourced from our village coffee growers. I've also attended Haitian masses at St. Theresa of Avila Church and the Basilica of the Sacred Heart, here in Washington. I have collected French language books for the St. Raymond's school library. At Pere's request, I obtained several musical instruments, including a digital keyboard and several guitars. The instruments are shipped in barrels that make weeks long trip from DC to Port-au-Prince. The music program at Mass is beautiful and lively and it was wonderful to see the instruments that I sent being used.

Do you have an embarrassing moment from one of your visits?

Toward the end of one of our visits, Pere Medard decided to prepare a feast for us. He wanted to serve meat from a young goat. The animal was killed with earshot of the rectory where we were staying. We heard frantic bleating and then silence soon after. The meal was prepared, and we all complimented Pere. The food was delicious, but I don't know if we could describe our mix of emotions over the meat.

How are you changed from having had your experiences in Haiti?

My experience has given me more empathy for the Haitian people and the town folk in Ansdano, especially with the destruction caused by Hurricane Matthew and more recently, the political violence. I am inspired by the resilience and hopefulness of the people in Ansdano. When I meet Haitians in this area, I share with them my experiences in Haiti, and it never fails to spark a lively conversation. It's almost like being there.



LARGE GRANT FOCUS: VIOLENCE PREVENTION IN YOUTH

2023-24 marks the 40th year that Holy Trinity Catholic Church has set aside a percentage of its income to address social justice concerns within the Archdiocese of the District of Columbia and beyond.

The Tithe Program seeks to address root causes of social justice issues across the DMV. In 2014, Holy Trinity Catholic Church began allocating a tithe portion to larger social justice grants (>\$20,000) focusing on a priority theme identified each year. These grants have supported social justice work by addressing issues systemically or by making investments to help sustain service and advocacy-oriented work.

The 2024 RFP focuses on the following priority theme: violence prevention in youth. We also evaluate small grant requests that address food insecurity, migration/refugees, the environment, homelessness, returning citizens, advocacy and youth. In 2024, we are also interested in projects that address mental health in teens and environmental advocacy.

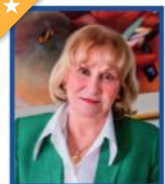
