# El Salvador's Conundrum Is Our Conundrum, Too By Rev. Benjamin B. Hawley, S.J.

While in San Salvador recently, groups of three or four of us visited families whose children receive \$300/year/child from our parishioners for basic school supplies. In each home we met with the mother, the child, and any other family members who happened to be home.

The group visiting each home included one Holy Trinity person who had made such visits before, one who could translate, and one or more guests, of whom I was one. In each case the mother invited us in and asked us to be seated. We talked with her and the child, usually about school and family life. I asked any children who played "football" (aka soccer) who their favorite player is. Lionel Messi was a clear favorite.

All these families belong to *Maria*, *Madre de los Pobres* Parish in the La Chacra neighborhood, one of San Salvador's poorest. In our conversations family members, children included, invariably told us how much safer and better their lives are, now that the police and military have cracked down on gangs.

As of January 2024, an estimated 75,000 Salvadorans have been imprisoned. This crackdown has made President Bukele very popular, despite the lack of due process offered to those arrested. But, for the people of La Chacra the streets and neighborhoods are now safer,



and the people feel freer and happier. (Google *Salvadoran Gang Crackdown* to read more about the situation.)

So, there is the conundrum: lack of due process in widespread dragnets, in tension with safe streets and better lives.

Before thinking about this conundrum *chez nous*, let's recall that no social problem exists in isolation from other problems. El Salvador has suffered extreme disparity of income for centuries and suffers it now. The Catholic Church has historically supported the rich, though its priests and lay people have been assassinated for serving the poor. The now-popular president is centralizing power in himself at the expense of the nation's constitution, judiciary, and legislature.

So, thinking about the tension between due process versus

safe streets requires sophisticated, multi-dimensional, multi-layered reflection infused with a Catholic sense of divine mercy and justice. Breezy off-the-cuff "conclusions" and political shibboleths do not substitute for thinking.

And now: our own country confronts a conundrum of a similar but not identical sort. On the one hand, corporate salaries and profits soar, while workers lose jobs. Religious leaders join political parties and stand by theologies that leave the poor to hopes of relief in heaven in the next life. Intolerance increases as those in power become more resistant to extending benefits to the newly-poor and the long-term poor.

On the other hand, some of the newly-poor and long-term poor have resorted to mass theft in broad daylight in "gangs." Rapidly rising rents in large cities have created more unhoused people, whose numbers overwhelm our institutions. The unhoused remain on the streets, and some turn violent.

Not surprisingly, into this mix come those who advocate Salvadoran-style "gang-busting." And yet those who would reject this response find themselves faced with insufficient institutional resources to give first priority to individual rights.

How can we address and resolve our own country's conundrum?

Somehow, we must make hard choices - and pray for God's mercy and justice - not only for individual people who suffer but also for the greater good for us all, for what Jesus calls The Kingdom. If we do not, forces we cannot control will make the choice for us, and, as scripture says, *The violent will bear it away*.



# Large Grant Focus: Violence Prevention in Youth

2023-24 marks the 40th year that Holy Trinity Catholic Church has set aside a percentage of its income to address social justice concerns within the Archdiocese of the District of Columbia and beyond.

The Tithe Program seeks to address root causes of social justice issues across the DMV. In 2014, Holy Trinity Catholic Church began allocating a tithe portion to larger social justice grants (>\$20,000) focusing on a priority theme identified each year.

The 2024 RFP focuses on the following priority theme: violence prevention in youth. We also evaluate small grant requests that address food insecurity, migration/refugees, the environment, homelessness, returning citizens, advocacy and youth. In 2024, we are also interested in projects that address mental health in teens and environmental advocacy. 
