Fourth Sunday of Lent - Laetare Sunday

Shrouded In Darkness, We Can Do Evil Jesus Invites Us Into The Light Of Truth Instead By Jaime L. Waters

Last Sunday, Holy Trinity's Women Who Stay hosted Professor Jaime Waters, who spoke on "Women of the Exodus." The following is her reflection on today's Gospel:

This year has been tumultuous already, and we are just in the first quarter. The events of the past few months, unfortunately, have revealed that many people are happy living in darkness, devoid of truth, love and justice. Today's Gospel calls us to embrace truth.

In a passage unique to John's Gospel, today we hear of an encounter between Iesus and the pharisee Nicodemus. The two discuss faith, miracles, the power of the Spirit and Jesus' significance. Notably, Jesus explains that his incarnation is a sign of divine love, and faith in him leads to everlasting life: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." This important declaration links the feasts of Christmas and Easter.

The Third Sunday of Advent is Gaudete ("rejoice") Sunday, and today, the Fourth Sunday of Lent, is Laetare ("rejoice") Sunday. As in Advent, in the middle of Lent,



we are reminded to rejoice in the incarnation and the passion, death and resurrection of Christ, as these acts reveal God's love.

Yet on this Sunday of joy, the Gospel also exposes us to the sad realities of both the ancient and modern world. Many people simply refuse to accept truth, preferring darkness over light as a place in which to do evil. John often uses light and darkness to represent those who accept and reject Jesus. The light motif first appears when John introduces Jesus as the light that shines through darkness (Jn 1:4-5, 9). When Jesus informs Nicodemus of his role in the world, he also acknowledges the ignorance and wickedness

in its midst. Not only do people in darkness reject Jesus; they loathe truth.

We have witnessed what happens when power is given to people who are averse to truth. Distorted realities and corruption persist, not only in government but in the minds and hearts of loyal followers. As we try to recover from years of lies and their effects, we must all come to grips with reality. Acts of hate and continued division are dark and evil, and people who truly want to embrace the light of Christ must also embrace truth.

LARGE GRANT FOCUS: VIOLENCE PREVENTION IN YOUTH

2023-24 marks the 40th year that Holy Trinity Catholic Church has set aside a percentage of its income to address social justice concerns within the Archdiocese of the District of Columbia and beyond.

The Tithe Program seeks to address root causes of social justice issues across the DMV. In 2014, Holy Trinity Catholic Church began allocating a tithe portion to larger social justice grants (>\$20,000) focusing on a priority theme identified each year.

The 2024 RFP focuses on the following priority theme: violence prevention in youth. We also evaluate small grant requests that address food insecurity, migration/refugees, the environment, homelessness, returning citizens, advocacy and youth. In 2024, we are also interested in projects that address mental health in teens and environmental advocacy. EXCERPT: NICARAGUAN, EXILED FROM HIS HOME COUNTRY, FINDS COMMUNITY AT DC PARISH

The number 222 is now a part of Miguel Flores' identity as much as his name. That's because a little more than a year ago, he was one of 222 Nicaraguans the government put on a plane en route to the capital of its biggest enemy: the United States.

"Of course I was scared, scared that we didn't know where we were going," Flores told National Catholic Reporter, recounting the experience of Feb. 9, 2023, the last time he saw his native Nicaragua.

He was 25 when he became a political prisoner after participating in anti-government protests. Using his tweets defending democracy as evidence, the government convicted him of conspiracy and spreading fake news, among other charges, and sentenced him to up to 10 years in prison.

But he had barely served two weeks when he found himself being transferred from a prison cell to a plane.

A year later, with support from parishioners at Washington's Holy Trinity Catholic Church, his English vocabulary has expanded; he has independent housing and has graduated from an apprenticeship that trains refugees in the District of Columbia for jobs in the culinary field. He recently started a job in the kitchen of an upscale Washington hotel.

But the past year hasn't been easy, no matter what it looks like from the outside, he said. He misses his mother and the rest of his family. He misses his country and all that means home to him, the streets of Managua, Nicaraguan food, and the smell of coffee at home. ...


