Mary Magdalene, Apostle to the Apostles

At our pastor Fr. Kevin Gillespie's recommendation, I saw the film "Cabrini" at a movie theater recently. It is an inspiring film set in the late 19th century about the determination of St. Francesca Xavier Cabrini to live out her missionary call to live the gospel. When the Vatican tried to deny her the freedom to found a missionary order of women, she reportedly argued that if Jesus entrusted the mission of announcing the resurrection to Mary Magdalene, "it would seem a very good thing to confide to other women an evangelizing mission."

We are now a quarter of the way through the 21st century, and you can be forgiven if you, too, need a reminder that the mission of announcing the good news was entrusted to Mary Magdalene. Next week on Easter Sunday, you will hear proclaimed that familiar—and funny!--passage from the Gospel of John about Peter and the other disciple racing to the empty tomb. What you will not hear, unless the presider decides to include the passages omitted from our lectionary, is the whole story. Here it is, with the omitted passages in bold:

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb.

So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him."

So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb.

They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in.

When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place.

Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed.

For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead

Then the disciples returned home.

But Mary stayed outside the tomb weeping.

And as she wept, she bent over into the tomb and saw two angels in white sitting there, one at the head and one at the feet where the body of Jesus had been.

And they said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken my Lord, and I don't know where they laid him."

When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus there, but did not know it was Jesus.

Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" She thought it was the gardener and said to him, "Sir, if you carried him away, tell me where you laid him, and I will take him."

Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni," which means Teacher.

Jesus said to her, "Stop holding on to me,* for I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and tell them, 'I am going to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."

Mary of Magdala went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord," and what he told her.

Earlier this month, Dr. Jaime Waters of Boston College gave a talk at Holy Trinity called "The Women of Exodus," in which she told the stories of Shiphrah and Puah, Miriam, and other courageous women of faith without whom there would have been no liberation for the Hebrew people enslaved in Egypt. Their stories are unfamiliar in part because they are left out of our lectionary, or what my friend Jane Varner Malhotra, a clever and creative Catholic, calls our "Selectionary." The lectionary, in a three-year cycle, recounts salvation history. Whether the omissions are intended or not, the impact is telling that most of the biblical accounts that present strong and courageous women spiritual leaders are left out

The appearance to Mary Magdalene of the risen Christ is an intimate and beautiful scene in a garden, a fitting image as we encounter Christ in our own riotously blooming springtime. As I read it, I hear Jesus lovingly speaking Mary's name, while Mary turns to him and lovingly responds. If you have heard this passage before, you may have focused on "Stop holding on to me," and imagined her falling to the ground and clinging desperately to him while Jesus recoils and tells her to stop. Many depictions in art have presented the scene in this way.

But Mary turned and saw Jesus; she was standing up. And our translation uses the word 'holding' but the truer translation from the Greek word is 'touching.' It is the same word used in the healing stories where Jesus touches a person, or a person touches him, and there is healing and wholeness. Mary Magdalene had brought oils to anoint Jesus' body in the tomb, and perhaps she hoped that by touching him, she could heal his wounds just as he had healed her wounds.

Instead, Jesus commissions her to go to the others, who are frightened and hiding in the Upper Room, and to tell them that he has risen and will be ascending, 'to my God and your God.' What a powerful story, one that elevates the memory of Mary Magdalene and could also—as St. Francis Cabrini realized over 100 years ago—help reclaim the rightful role of women in the Church.

*If you are interested in exploring your own calling to preach the good news, the School of Theology and Ministry at Boston College has launched a new program, Courage to Preach,

designed to equip lay and ordained ministers (especially those who work with young adults) to read and interpret Scripture as a foundation to preach on issues such as racial, economic, and environmental justice.

KINO BORDER INITIATIVE

If you are interested in learning more about the border - then consider joining members on an immersion trip to the Kino Border Initiative in Nogales, Arizona April 5-9. The Kino Border Initiative (KBI) is a binational organization that works in the area of migration and is located in Nogales, Arizona and Nogales, Sonora, Mexico. It is named after Fr. Eusebio Kino, an early Jesuit missionary in the Sonoran Desert. The KBI's vision is to help make humane, just, workable migration between the U.S. and Mexico a reality. Its mission is to promote US/Mexico border and immigration policies that affirm the dignity of the human person and a spirit of bi-national solidarity.

The goals of this trip are to humanize, accompany, and complicate. We often talk in the abstract about immigration and the border, but the word humanize means to listen to firsthand stories and experiences and recognize the dignity of each individual, whether they be migrants or border residents. Accompany means that we will be on a journey over the course of the days on immersion. You will have the opportunity to bear witness at the moment of deportation through conversations with deported migrants as well as along many different points in the journey, such as the desert and the federal courthouse. The focus of the immersion is not service, but rather presence. Complicate means that the simple answers are oftentimes the wrong ones. Instead, we invite participants to explore questions, nuance and the many different puzzle pieces of migration and the border without having to come to a definitive conclusion.




