Migration With Dignity: A Reflection on the Kino Border Initiative

The Kino Border Initiative (KBI) www.kinoborderinitiative.org is a binational ministry on the border of Nogales, Arizona, USA and Nogales, Sonora, Mexico. Recently a group of seven Holy Trinity parishioners and two colleagues from St. Ignatius parish in Boston made a pilgrimage to Nogales in collaboration with KBI. Holy Trinity's connection with KBI started in 2017 thanks in large part to parishioner Margie Legowski who led several previous trips. Our April 2024 trip was thoughtfully coordinated and led by Eric Nicoll and Paul Wolfteich.

"Migration with Dignity" is KBI's vision. Their mission is to promote humane, just, and workable migration through:

- direct humanitarian assistance and holistic accompaniment of migrants,
- education and encounter between migrants and others that transforms people and communities toward solidarity with migrant, and
- policy advocacy in Mexico and the US.

KBI's Migrant Outreach Center in Nogales, Mexico is the heart of its humanitarian assistance and holistic accompaniment. Migrants who come there receive food, shelter, clothing, legal assistance, and medical attention.

Soon after arriving, migrants meet with KBI staff who assist with securing temporary housing and work in Nogales, Mexico as most will wait for a period of time (days, weeks, or longer) for an asylum-processing appointment in the hope of entering the US legally.

A key part of KBI's education and encounter ministry is to work with groups like ours to inform and deepen our understanding. Upon our arrival we were greeted heartily by Pete Neely, SJ who helped to orient and prepare us for our three full days at the border. While there we had countless opportunities to think deeply about the humanitarian crisis, the importance of holistic accompaniment, and how increasingly complicated a challenging situation has become due to competing perspectives, interests, and priorities.

Over the course of the next three days we:

- crossed the US/Mexican border twice – quickly and easily, having only to show passports when re-entering the US,
- toured downtown Nogales, Sonora – a border town to which countless US citizens come and go freely each year to partake of the booming medical tourism,
- visited the Migrant Outreach Center two times – where we helped with meal service; and had the opportunity to meet some of the individuals and families staying there and to hear their stories directly,
- visited with ranchers on the Arizona side of the border – who live in fear of the cartels that transport drugs and traffic migrants, at times across their ranches; and oppose “illegal migrants,” but have installed drinking fountains on the wells on their ranch because they also don’t want people who cross illegally into the US via their land to die of dehydration,
- met with US Border Patrol agents and toured the Nogales Border Patrol station – where we heard about surveillance and border protection activities related to the largely separate matters of drug smuggling by the cartels and migrants seeking to enter the US, and
- hiked through a section of the Sonoran Desert along the US/Mexican border.

The stories we heard were harrowing: family members who were killed for refusing to join a gang, homes that were repeatedly shot upon, small businesses that were crippled by shakedown fees, and so many more. In 2023, 83% of those who arrived to the KBI cited violence or political persecution as their primary reason for migrating (up from 67% in 2021).

The candid perspectives that were shared were compelling and sobering. Most migrants had endured a ubiquitous reality of extortion, robbery, and assault by gang and cartel members throughout the long journey as they fled for safety. At the Nogales port of entry, migrants are expected to use the Customs and Border Patrol app to schedule an asylum processing appointment. The CBP claims the app has increased efficiency and cut out smugglers, but the app requires access to a smart phone and data plan, as well as

literacy and technological ability - as such, it can be a digital barrier to asylum for some.

Some migrants feel they cannot wait an unpredictable period for an asylum appointment, or are afraid their asylum appeal will be denied. They may choose to cross the border through one of the numerous gaps in the border fence. As the fence (or “wall”) has been extended, the gaps (some of which are miles wide) are increasingly further from urban areas in remote and inhospitable terrain. Equally treacherous, those “routes” are now largely controlled by cartels that rob, extort, assault and/or kill migrants who try to cross on their own.

During our hike in the Sonoran Desert, we came across many items that had been left or lost by migrants along the way. Discarded food wrappers no longer needed, along with items essential to survival like shoes, socks, and even a birth certificate ... as well cherished keepsakes including photos of loved ones left behind, and a beautiful Our Lady of Guadeloupe medal. On the day of our walk, the hot and arid climate was countered a bit by pockets of vibrant wildflowers. But nothing offset the challenge of safely navigating the dry, uneven terrain scattered with rocks and pebbles, coupled with a proliferation of scrub bushes and overhanging mesquite tree limbs – brittle and sharp, creating an ever-present risk of a skin puncture that could become infected.

The Nogales port of entry is indeed a complicated place. While there we had the blessing to meet many migrants who, God willing, are en route to a safer and more secure life for themselves and their families. We are deeply grateful to them and to the dedicated and faith-filled KBI staff and volunteers (Pete, Ben, Joanna, Eileen, Inigo, Sr. Engracia, Tracey and so many others) who so eagerly welcomed us to learn with and from them. The Kino Border Initiative is a transcendent ministry of holistic accompaniment, human dignity and resiliency – a place where Matthew 25:40 “Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me” is a way of life.
