Parishioners Learn About Life In DC Jail Prison Visits with the Frederick Douglass Project for Justice *By Joan Maher*

Beginning in January, the Holy Trinity bulletin was advertising a chance to visit and learn about life in the DC jail. The opportunity intrigued me. My only other jail experience was my cell (residence) in an abandoned bombed-out federal prison in Mogadishu, Somalia, as an International Committee of the Red Crescent/Cross Healthcare Volunteer in the 1990s.

The visits are a partnership between Holy Trinity and The Frederick Douglass Project for Justice, which “seeks to change the public’s perception of the criminal justice system by becoming proximate with the humanity of incarcerated people.” The Douglass Project has been a Holy Trinity tithe recipient in recent years, and was most recently granted \$17,000 for 2024.

On April 15, nine Holy Trinity parishioners and I had the privilege to visit with roughly 25 adult male prisoners at the DC Jail’s Central Treatment Facility for about 90 minutes. They were fresh shaven in their bright orange uniforms. The program we visited was called “Young Men Emerging.” These men, ages 18 – 24, had been promoted into this program, which provides intensive programming and education to prepare them for life on the outside.



As we started in a large round chair discussion with nearly 50 individuals, we gave our first name, where we were from, and what makes us feel super loved. This opener brought us all to common ground as most felt they were super loved by their families. I replied I feel super loved by my God. Then we broke up into four small groups. My small group included a prison staffer, Cindy from HT, Alfonso, Joaquin, Bird, and me.

In the best possible way, the energy in the room was deafening. Our next discussion question was, “What do you need more of in your life and what do you need less of in your life?” Our group agreed on the need for more time, love, and money and less stress.

We spoke of our worst habits. Lusting and eating too much were a few examples. I shared with the group a serious addiction I have overcome. When interest in books came up, Alfonso said his favorite book is Malcolm X. We segued to a lively discussion about sports.

“Ask us anything,” Bird offered, and Cindy and I did—probing them on prison food, their jobs in prison, and other aspects of their lives. Our final question was, “If you could tell your younger self one thing, what would it be?” “Listen more” resounded.

During our reflections with the larger group, I became keenly aware of how similar we all are. Our conversations were meaningful, intimate, and honest. We parted with hugs.

I am grateful to have had this opportunity, and I invite you to participate—especially the young adults of Holy Trinity. As the problem of over-incarceration abounds, one by one, let’s come to a better understanding of the lives of those on the inside.

Creation Care Corner

INTEGRAL ECOLOGY is a concept Pope Francis explores in his encyclical *Laudato Si'*. It's a perspective needed if we want to make significant progress on creation care concerns because "...everything in the world is connected" (LS 16). "Nature...", Francis writes, "cannot be regarded as something separate from ourselves or as a mere setting in which we live." "We are part of nature." So, in considering solutions to the environmental crisis, we need to "seek comprehensive solutions which consider the interactions within natural systems themselves and with social systems." This, Francis says, is because "we are not faced with two separate crises, one environmental and the other social, but rather one complex crisis which is both social and environmental."

By adopting a perspective based on an integral ecology, new insights can be generated for a more holistic approach to problem solving that promotes care for each other, as well as the earth. Francis states, "...that genuine care for our own lives and our relationships with nature is inseparable from fraternity, justice and faithfulness to others" (LS 70). And in recognizing our interconnectedness within the ecosystems that sustain us, we will stop seeing God's creation as simply existing to serve our needs. 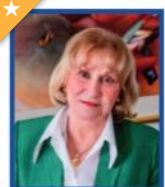
