Holy Trinity Teens Inspired By Summer Service Project By Aziza Kennedy, parishioner and rising 11th grader

My expectations for the 2024 Baltimore Summer Service Retreat were that the other volunteers and I would mainly be going to and from service sites each day, and that it would be a busy and challenging experience. This expectation was partly correct because we visited lots of service sites, one each day from morning until afternoon.

But there was a lot more to this trip than just work. It was so much more fun than I had expected. Almost every evening we would do a fun activity, such as seeing an Orioles baseball game, going to the pool, getting ice cream, and playing games together at night before lights out. It was such an enjoyable experience, and I truly connected with the other high school volunteers.

The service that we participated in was real work, but it was also fulfilling and a big part of the fun. We participated in service projects at four different sites over the course of five days, from serving food, to playing with kids, to having meaningful conversations with elders - the trip was packed with a diverse spectrum of service.

Near the end of the trip, we went to Baltimore Station, a residence for veterans who had experienced homelessness and alcoholism. We played trivia, made lunch, and then ate lunch with the residents. The most impactful part of





that visit, and possibly even the entire trip, was talking one-on-one with the veterans, particularly one named Michael. He told me funny stories from his childhood, stories about different places he had stayed globally, and expressed his love for traveling along with his sadness that he would not be able to anymore. I felt that Michael and I were able to accompany one another in Christ by finding similarities with each other and having a very open conversation despite our different walks of life.

Another moment that impacted me was on our last full day of the trip. We went to Jenkins Nursing Home & Day

program for seniors and for people recovering from severe injuries. I was having a great time playing bingo and word trivia with them. A particular conversation that was very meaningful to me was with a woman sitting next to me named Michelle.

Michelle told me that she had survived two brain aneurysms and after the second one, she had to learn how to speak all over again because she was not able to form full sentences or complete thoughts. Although she had gone through such traumatic events, Michelle has a very positive outlook on life and often repeated how grateful she is just to be breathing. She told me how she believes that everything in life has meaning, and that God is always guiding us down our life's path. I left Jenkins Nursing Home that day feeling truly touched by Michelle's story and her gratitude toward God despite life's challenges.

I will carry the truly inspirational conversations I had with Michael and Michelle on this trip with me for quite some time. This experience connects to our parish's mission as we, the volunteers, were able to spend quality time and find similarities to those with various backgrounds and experiences. At the end of each day, at our retreat house, the other HTC volunteers/chaperones and I would say a final Examen and reflect on our day. I really appreciated these moments we had together and that we were celebrating God's love and the gifts he had given us each day.



Although it may be hard to say that I fulfilled the third pillar of our parish's mission, "Transform Lives," I do believe that by making and serving meals to those facing food insecurity and by simply conversing with others, we were able to brighten their day. My own confidence in opening up to others has increased and the lessons I will carry with me from my conversations with Michael and Michelle have inspired me to continue to search for more opportunities to serve others. I am truly grateful to have been able to participate in the 2024 Baltimore Summer Service Retreat!

PREVENTING GUN VIOLENCE Beginning September 2024

Just Faith launched a new program on gun violence that the Social Justice ministry would like to offer in the fall if there is enough interest. Grounded in Christian faith, this program aspires to move beyond the divisive rhetoric of gun ownership versus gun control, instead inviting participants to discern solutions to the gun violence epidemic.

Dispose of household hazardous waste (HHW)


properly. Leftover household products that can catch fire, react, or explode under certain circumstances, or that are corrosive or toxic are considered HHWs. Products such as paints, cleaners, oils, batteries, and pesticides can contain hazardous ingredients and require special care when you dispose of them. Do not dispose HHWs to landfills, or pour into drains or ditches. Save toxic chemicals and electronic materials for periodic collections. Check with your city, township or county for upcoming HHW collection events, and with your state EPA office for permanent HHW drop site locations. Unused medications can also have harmful effects, including polluting waterways and the environment if they are flushed or thrown in the trash. Some local police stations and large retail pharmacies (Meijer) take back unused meds. Don't forget that electronics are also hazardous waste. TRAIN A JESUIT IN RWANDA AND BURUNDI

The Rwanda-Burundi Region of the Society of Jesus was created in 1999. It previously had been part of the Central African Province along with the Democratic Republic of Congo. It is the watershed tragedy of the Genocide in 1994 and regional security problems that caused the split. Today, the Region counts around 100 Jesuits, and more than 70% of them are still in formation. The average cost to train a Jesuit in Africa, per year, is \$9,000, and it takes about twelve years to form one Jesuit. During and after their training, Jesuits in Rwanda and Burundi actively work in education, services to help the poor, retreat centers, healing and reconciliation ministries,


