The Baptism of the Lord

Catechists Are Facilitators Of An Encounter With Christ

Leading up to my first session as a catechist, I observed a Triduum of sorts: three days of readying myself for the banquet feast of God’s love I would help host for the children in our faith formation program over the course of the upcoming year. On a practical level, I was all set to go. The faith formation and religious education team was familiar to me thanks to my experience serving in the youth ministry, and my experienced co-catechist, Mimi Reitz, had a full year of lesson plans already drafted. Yet as that first Sunday of third-grade catechism drew closer, I felt a certain restlessness.

God’s call to be a catechist truly surprised me. I knew that I cherished children and that I loved God, but I myself had not participated in children’s faith formation—so I was determined to make up in three days what I might be lacking from the missing decade or more of my own formal faith formation. Of course, God has ways of surprising us and transforming our understanding. Through catechism training, I encountered realizations of what it actually means to be a catechist that awakened me to some of the reasons why God had called me into this role.

“As a catechist, [I am] the most important resource in the faith formation setting.” What a weighty realization this



was, and yet such a freeing one! As the “spiritual mentor for a group of apprentices,” my own identity and experience as a practicing Catholic have played an integral part in awakening in the children of our parish an understanding of what it means to know God’s word and integrate it into a Christian life. During a collective Examen, which is my class’s usual opening prayer, I decided to model humility by sharing, with an example appropriate and relatable for children, my own prayer intention for forgiveness. When they saw that I was willing to humble myself before God (and before them), they became bolder in sharing their own prayer intentions with sincerity and reverence.

“We are not teachers of a subject, but facilitators of an encounter with Christ.” This distinction is critical and has informed on a fundamental level the approach I take to

guiding children on their journey of growing in faith. As I learned from the training, there is a huge difference between “I would like to tell you about someone” and “I would like you to meet someone.” One of the most fruitful sessions I led was centered on what it means to love each other as brothers and sisters in Christ, as proclaimed in 1 Thessalonians 4:9-12. After watching a video about the life of St. Elizabeth of Hungary, the children were full of thoughts and questions about a scene depicting an encounter with Christ. We had a deep and moving conversation driven by their curiosity and insights about the meaning of sacrifice and what it means to see God in others.

“Catechesis is so much more than simply the conveyance of information: It is an apprenticeship in a lifestyle.” This insight redirected my attention from my mind to my heart and soul. To be a good catechist, I do not have to be a walking textbook! The essential role of the catechist is accompaniment, built on trust, along a spiritual journey “directed toward growth and holiness.” Thus, intellectual knowledge of Scripture and Church tradition is only one part of the equation. Just as essential to catechesis are the characteristics of my spirituality, such as my openness to God and the coherence and authenticity of my life.

“God doesn’t call the qualified, but rather God qualifies the called.” I started the catechetical training looking for a credential to be my seal of approval, but I finished the training remembering that Jesus called to Him and sent forth not the credentialed but the open-hearted. Fulfillment of the role of catechist does not demand “perfection or even mastery” of an external nature; it requires qualities reflective of an internal disposition, such as generosity of spirit and strength of character. These subtler, more refined qualities can be readily supplemented with knowledge that can be gained and techniques that can be learned.

How might a current or potential catechist gain that knowledge and learn those techniques, you ask? Hint, hint! The *Catechetical Formation Series* by Loyola Press is an excellent resource.

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LARGE GRANT FOCUS ANNOUNCED

2024-25 marks the 41st year that Holy Trinity Catholic Church has set aside a percentage of its income to address social justice concerns within the Archdiocese of the District of Columbia and surrounding areas. The Tithe Program seeks to address root causes of social justice issues across the DMV. In 2014, Holy Trinity Catholic Church began allocating a portion of the tithe to larger social justice grants (>\$20,000) focusing on a priority theme identified each year. These grants have supported social justice work by addressing issues systemically or by making investments to help sustain service and advocacy-oriented work.

The large grant individual award ranges from \$50,000 to \$100,000. There is a separate guideline document for small grant applicants available on our website. Small grant awards range from \$5,000 to \$20,000. The 2025 Large Grant RFP focuses on the priority theme of unaccompanied migrant minors in the District of Columbia and surrounding areas. Unaccompanied children (UAC) are children under age 18 who lack both lawful immigration status in the United States and a parent or legal guardian in the United States, or a parent or legal guardian in the United States who is available to provide care and physical custody.

The DC metropolitan region continues to see a dramatic increase in the number of unaccompanied children and families with children immigrating here.

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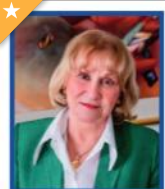


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
