Pilgrims of Hope Travel To Alabama

There were twenty-seven of us, mostly from Holy Trinity Parish, who last weekend went on a pilgrimage to civil rights sites in Montgomery and Selma, Alabama. At the 11:30 Mass the previous weekend many of us were missioned. This sense of being sent served as an invitation to engage the spirit of The Jubilee year which calls Catholics from around the world to be “Pilgrims of Hope.”

Our pilgrimage was organized by the Catholic Mobilizing Network (CMN). The Network is a national organization that, according to its Mission Statement, “mobilizes Catholics and all people of goodwill to value life over death, to end the use of the death penalty, to transform the U.S. criminal legal system from punitive to restorative, and to build capacity in U.S. society to engage in restorative practices.”

Through a series of informative and inspiring conversations, meetings and tours we encountered the trauma of the past and the tragedy of the present. History intersected with our own stories when our pilgrims visited the Dexter Parsonage (former home of Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.), the historic and Catholic-sponsored City of Jude, the Legacy Museum: From Slavery to Mass Justice, the National Memorial for Peace and Justice, and the Freedom Monument Sculpture Park. The latter three sites are recent centers sponsored by the Equal Justice Initiative (EJI). Founded in 1989 by attorney and author

Bryan Stephenson, the EJI is dedicated to “ending mass incarceration, racial injustice, and inequality in the United States. Beyond legal advocacy, EJI has sought to reshape the narrative about America’s history of racial oppression.”

Through information and images each of the EJI sponsored museums challenges the viewer to consider the narrative of racial oppression. For example, The National Memorial for Peace and Justice provided provocative information about lynching. Between 1877 to 1950 a total of 4,084 lynchings occurred in 12 Southern states and another 300 in Northern states. These facts were reinforced by the museum’s structure where there are eight hundred suspended Corten steel monuments, representing the

counties in the United States where racial terror lynchings occurred. Each monument has the names of the victims engraved on its surface.

Besides the reflections prompted by the museums, our pilgrimage led us to enter into the sites of civil rights history. For example, one evening we walked together quietly over the Edmund Pettus Bridge, the site of the brutal Bloody Sunday beatings of civil rights marchers on March 7, 1965, during the first march for voting rights. Our walk was preceded by a talk by Ms. Thelma Dianne Harris who as one of the “foot soldiers” described in vivid detail her experiences of witnessing firsthand the brutality of that tragic time.

Another moving experience was a tour of the Dexter Church Parsonage where Martin Luther King and his family lived. There, a guide who knew Dr. King and his family showed us the dent in the cement of the front porch where a bomb nearly cost Dr. King and his family’s lives in 1956. She also invited us into the kitchen and pointed out the table where Dr. King, in a decisive moment of his life, discerned prayerfully as to whether or not he should continue his efforts of faith and justice at considerable risk to his life and the lives of his family. As our guide noted it was at this table that he experienced an epiphany with God to continue his courageous endeavors of faith and justice.

It is important to note that our pilgrimage included several hopeful encounters when we witnessed the justice endeavors at the City of St. Jude, the efforts of The Edmunite Mission in Selma and the inspiring Gospel music liturgy which closed our pilgrimage at Resurrection Church. Our band of Holy Trinity pilgrims was blessed by the people of CMN who helped us to process together the seeds of hope that inspire actions of justice inspired by our faith.

This weekend, when you arrived at church, you may have noticed a new banner about the Year of Jubilee and its theme “Pilgrims of Hope.” The banner quotes Pope Francis who on Christmas Eve launched the Jubilee Year, stating The Jubilee calls “for all those who are in bondage to forms of slavery old and new.” As parishioners sent by the parish to Montgomery and Selma, we have tried to live out these words and become “Pilgrims of Hope”.

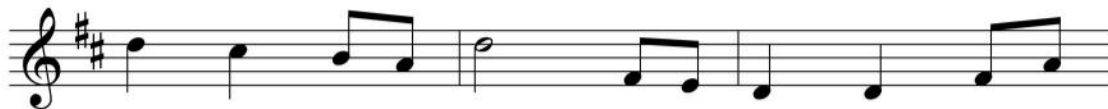

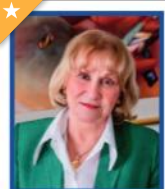
