Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Venerable Mother Mary Lange

On the morning of Saturday, February 8 in the chapel of the Oblate Sisters of Providence Motherhouse in Catonsville, MD, I was in attendance with over 40 people who were gathered for a yearly Mass to commemorate the death of Venerable Mother Mary Lange, one of the six African Americans on the path to sainthood. On the weekend around February 3 each year, the Oblate Sisters of Providence gather with supporters, such as Mother Mary Lange Guild, friends and fellow sisters to mark this occasion with history, reflection, Eucharist and fellowship. But who exactly is Mother Lange?

The nativity story tells of Jesus being born in a manger “because there was no room for them in the inn (Luke 2:7).” This can also describe the experiences of African Americans and what Mother Lange sought to remedy throughout her life. Mother Lange, a Cuba-born immigrant from a French community, would make her journey to Baltimore in 1813 and go on to answer God’s call to make room by establishing a school for African American children, the Oblate School for Colored Girls. Now known as Saint Frances Academy, it is the oldest continuously operating African American Catholic high school.

Before alums such as jazz singer Billie Holiday and basketball player Angel Reese walked the hallways, Mother



Lange would make room for education because no place existed publicly for African American children until 1868. She would do the same thing for African American women who sought religious life when she became the foundress of the Oblate Sisters of Providence (OSP) in 1829. Initially under the directorship of the Sulpicians, the Oblates also spent time in directorship under the Jesuits in 1860 when they began expanding to other areas outside of Baltimore. This relationship lasted until 1871 when the Josephite Fathers and Brothers became the OSP directors, which continues until today.

It is in her struggles and accomplishments we can find great hope as a people of faith. For so long, Venerable Lange had

to fight through the pain of rejection, not of who she was as a person but simply being of a color others refused to recognize as being worthy. Discouraging as it might have been to go through the tough times, Mother Lange and her companions persevered with the support of others who did believe in her. It serves as a reminder that we must put our faith in God and our own vocations and stand in solidarity with our brothers and sisters who need our caring and support.

My story with the Oblates and Venerable Lange are both older and more recent. The Oblate Sisters were a presence throughout the city of Baltimore and the work of Mother Lange is an important part of Baltimore Black Catholic history. Every year in the month of February, the Office of Black Catholic Ministry of Baltimore awards members of the Black Catholic parishes gifts of appreciation for service, leadership and youth in commemoration of Mother Mary Lange. I received a youth award in 2002.

During the pandemic, my relationship with the Oblate Sisters would grow as the need for connection through live streaming services would allow me to use my own gifts to help out the sisters when needed. Whether it be a tea/jazz brunch, final/renewal of vow ceremonies or the commemoration Mass, it has become an honor to share those experiences with those who may not be there at the time but still support and be in relationship with the sisters. It is in these celebrations and interactions I can better encounter and understand how the life, legacy and mission of venerable Lange exists today: through the efforts of St. Frances Academy, the Oblate Sisters of Providence, and all the lives they have touched over the years.

In her prayer for beatification, it states, *“Mother Lange’s love for all enabled her to see Christ in each person, and the pain of prejudice and racial hatred endured never blurred that vision.”* May we strive to make room as she did, and make her wish our wish in “doing the will of God.”

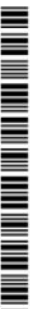

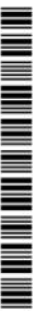

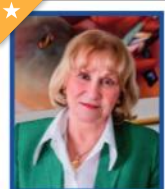
