The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

With And For Others: Reflections On The Arrupe Leaders Summit by Piper Lagoey, student at Elizabeth Seton High School

Earlier this year, the Holy Trinity Social Justice Ministry sponsored two Elizabeth Seton students to participate in the Arrupe Leaders Summit. Piper Lagoey has shared her reflection on the experience.

A few weeks ago, Pedro Arrupe was just a historical figure to me, someone known for powerful words. But, after attending the Arrupe Leaders Summit, thanks to the sponsorship of the Holy Trinity Social Justice Ministry, I understand that his words are more than just inspiration they are a challenge. The life of Fr. Arrupe has inspired me to lead my community in the fight for social justice. Through games, open discussions, and prayerful meditation, I learned not only how to be a more effective leader but also what it means to discern, to challenge unjust systems, and to build a movement rooted in love and solidarity.

I have always considered myself a person of justice who cares about peace, nonviolence, and community building through direct action. However, at the summit, the ideas of my own commitment to justice were questioned and changed for the better. Throughout the summit, we were challenged with several games, one of which required team collaboration; each team was given a limited supply of materials, forcing us to negotiate, strategize, and





compete with other groups. Although I like to think of myself as someone who values diplomacy and giving to those in need without expecting anything back, it was easy to be swept up in the chaos of completing the tasks. As the game intensified, I saw how quickly desperation can drive people to act against their values. We often found ourselves stealing materials or keeping unused elements to ourselves. Highlighting how, in instances where resources are scarce, people are more likely to resort to violence to meet their needs, perpetuating cycles of oppression. This activity gave me a deeper understanding of the importance

of addressing the root cause of issues in addition to providing charity. The two steps of social justice include charitable acts, which address people's current needs, and working for systemic change, which is the work to address the root cause of an issue. Working for both sides of social justice issues creates a more effective movement.

Another activity that pushed my way of thinking was a game centered around bending the rules. The objective was to complete an organizational task in the fastest time, but to succeed, teams needed to go beyond the outlined rules to create new, faster methods. At first, we were all apprehensive and found it unfair when we discovered that other teams had beaten us by seemingly breaking the rules. But as we reflected through a group discussion, we learned that some rules are meant to be broken. While the rules of a game aren't oppressive, when we applied them to real-world situations, we quickly saw that when laws or structures uphold inequality, it is our responsibility to challenge them. From the Civil Rights and Nuclear Disarmament Movements to modern-day activism, civil disobedience has always been a crucial tool in dismantling oppression. The summit reinforced that leadership sometimes means knowing when to play by the rules and when to reject them entirely.

I believe the most efficient way to build a just society is to build just communities. Working with other like-minded students emphasized the importance of community and friendship in peacebuilding. From the moment we entered the O'Dwyer Retreat House, we were welcomed by the Ignatian Solidarity Network staff and summit participants. While at first, we sat in separate groups, divided by school and familiarity, those divisions quickly faded, with small connections forming into full friendships. Mealtime conversations provided a space for reflection, and card games replaced the usual instinct to retreat to our phones. The sense of community made everyone comfortable sharing their ideas and being vulnerable with their experiences. Being surrounded by people who share my passion for justice was a powerful experience. It reminded me that movements are never built alone; justice is collective. We challenged each other to think deeper, consider perspectives we hadn't before, and recognize the power in our collective action. Even after the summit, the community remains strong, with people constantly talking in group chats, playing online games together, or checking in on each other's social justice work. We all learned that change happens not through isolated efforts but through people coming together, pushing one another to go further, and holding each other accountable in the pursuit of something greater.

At the heart of Jesuit leadership is the idea of Magis, to always seek the greater in everything, not in the pursuit of personal success, but to be in service to others. The summit reinforced that leadership is about pushing boundaries, dreaming bigger, and taking risks. Now that I have been given the light of knowledge, I pray for the grace to do the challenging work for justice. The fight for justice isn't easy; it can be messy and discouraging, but peace will never be achieved if no one is willing to work for it. As Fr. Arrupe reminds us, "if we fall in love with justice, with God, "and stay in love, it will decide everything. Fr. Arrupe's life's work challenges us not just to believe in justice but to embody it. And that is exactly what I intend to do.

YOUTH SUMMER SERVICE EXPERIENCES June and July 2025


