PRISON WALLS CONFINE BUT THEY ALSO CONCEAL

*"I was in prison and you came to me"
Matthew, 25:36*

Holy Trinity's mission statement offers this pledge in the form of a statement: "We are a Jesuit parish that welcomes all to: accompany one another in Christ, celebrate God's love, transform lives." Here I address the specific commitment of accompanying incarcerated citizens from imprisonment to their release and re-entry into communities, sometimes after decades of absence.

By way of introducing my own reflections on my participation I suggest the following exercise for you:

Think back over your life three, or two, or even just one decade ago in relation to present realities— and you can begin to imagine the enormous adjustments you would have to make upon your release? What scars would you carry from the experience? How might you have to come to accept responsibilities for having injured others, perhaps even ended their lives? How have the intervening years changed you and how might that change be realized in your new future?

I have invoked your imagination, a very Jesuit exercise, because I have been challenged to expand mine with each



encounter. Frederick Douglass captured well the necessary work: "I saw nothing without seeing it, I heard nothing without hearing it, and felt nothing without feeling it." The returning citizens initiative is a standing invitation to do just that.

What have I begun to see, hear, feel?

Three in-person jail visits, two in the D.C. jail and most recently one in the Arlington County jail, as well as a virtual meeting at the correctional facility in Benton, CO, have provided stark examples of the following: while incarceration is incarceration no matter where it occurs, it can and does take place in very different ways with enormous consequences for the inmates and, by implication, for society.

Clearly, the particulars of the facility (location, age, upkeep, crowding, food, arrangement of rooms, availability of services/programs/electronics, health care) make a huge difference. D.C.s’ correctional facility is a particularly instructive example of how that plays out. But I suggest that leadership culture is equally critical: is the facility administered in a past- and back-ward looking, overwhelmingly security-driven and punitive manner or does it create spaces, quite literally, to be future- and forward-looking and rehabilitative? After all, a significant percentage of the incarcerated population, even within a punitive system, will at some point re-enter society. How has the prison used their time within to prepare them for life without, in its double meaning?

Dominant narratives about inmates, legal constraints, and allocation of perennially limited resources are critical factors. But each is driven by the larger societal context. For that reason, the Frederick Douglass Project for Justice directed by Marc Howard, a partner for Holy Trinity, takes this approach: direct personal encounter by the citizenry is needed to change narratives and public policy. Prison walls confine but they also conceal, preventing us from even knowing, not to mention understanding on a human level, what goes on inside.

However it occurs, accompanying returning citizens is likely to require long-term engagement, often with uncertain outcomes. A number of us shared meals over some months with residents of Freedom House in Anacostia, a facility that provided much-needed temporary housing. Ever so cautiously, the family-style gatherings led to trust, openness, even laughter and joy. So, what was accomplished? Perhaps nothing more and nothing less than the residents’ sense of being appreciated and our coming to understand more deeply the enormous challenge of building trust, both individually and among societal groups. Both offering and receiving mercy in the act of restoring trust that has been broken for a long time is a demanding task.

Where to get help? We in the Catholic community might find guidance and support in Pope Leo XIV’s first apostolic exhortation *Dilexi Te* – precisely because these words were originally spoken to a Christian

community who, much like the incarcerated, experienced violence and contempt and had little power. And yet they heard: “I have loved you.”

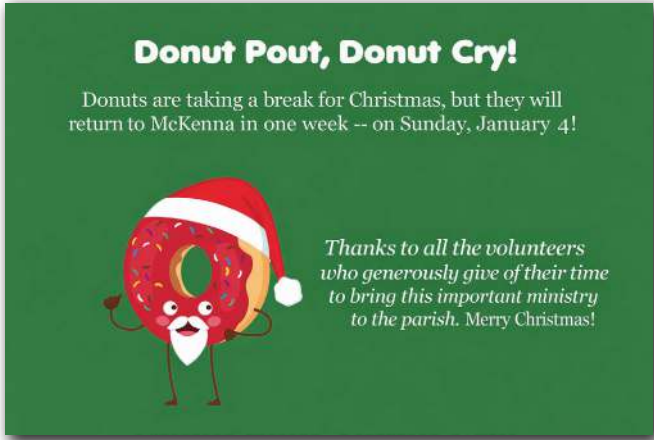
What hopes can I nurture going forward?

Through this initiative I have been privileged to encounter so many people who have chosen to assert their own and others’ humanity. I mention the following:

- Parishioner Diane Oakley coordinates a pen pal program with inmates through the Order of Malta. A regular meeting I attended with her of the Gatekeepers in Hagerstown, MD, where diverse civic groups coordinate their efforts to empower returning citizens, was a true inspiration (gatekeepersmd.org/).
- The Returning Citizens Action Network, based at the NY Avenue Presbyterian Church, offers support, including outreach to the DC Public Defenders Office, often among the first to become aware of specific needs.
- Families affected by incarceration rally against mandatory sentencing regimes that especially affect communities of color (famm.org).
- And finally, the witness of former inmates whom we have met at HT programs is particularly convincing. As Rob Barton of More Than Our Crimes states: “We’re not violent offenders. We’re individuals who committed violent crimes. But we’re different people now.” They have delivered rich evidence for that by creating paths for others not just toward life outside the prison walls but by assuming mentoring and leadership roles.

Together, all encourage us to see, hear, and feel, and heed the call issued so well in a letter to the Frederick Douglass Project by an inmate of the Benton facility: we on the outside have the unique opportunity to serve as their “voices of hope”.

It is a suitable challenge as we begin the New Year 2026.

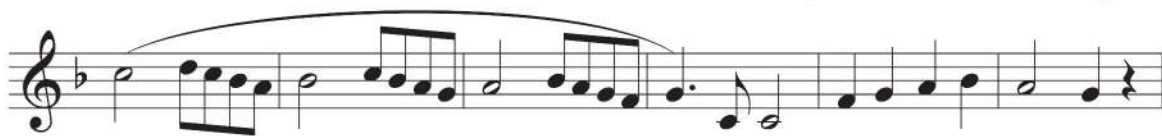

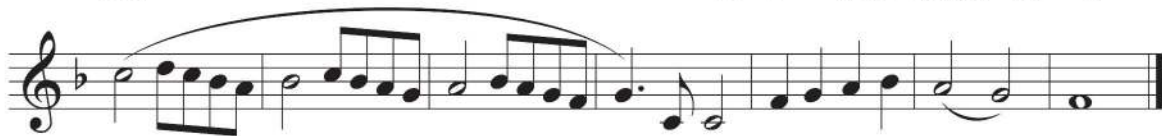
