Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Lent: Walking Together Toward Easter

Lent is not simply “forty days of giving something up.” It is the Church’s annual school of conversion, an intense and grace-filled season that prepares us to celebrate the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ known as the Paschal Mystery. It’s something the Church does liturgically through prayer, symbol, silence, and song.

The Second Vatican Council proclaims that the liturgy is the “source and summit” of the Church’s life (Sacrosanctum Concilium, no. 10) and that the liturgical year unfolds the mysteries of Christ so the faithful may be drawn into them and filled with saving grace (SC, no. 102). The liturgies of Lent draw us toward conversion so that Easter does not arrive merely as a date on the calendar, but as a renewed life in Christ.

This journey begins on Ash Wednesday with striking honesty. We hear “Remember that you are dust...” Yet this is not a word of despair, it is the truth of God’s mercy announced aloud. As Preface I of Lent reminds us, God gives this season so that we may await “the sacred paschal feasts...with the joy of minds made pure,” becoming “more eagerly intent on prayer and on the works of charity” (Roman Missal, Preface I of Lent: The Spiritual Meaning of Lent). We receive and bear ashes as a sign of hope: a clear reminder that conversion is possible and our loving God awaits our continuing conversion.



WHAT CHANGES AT MASS

Certain elements of the Mass change to form our desire and focus our hearts.

The Gloria is omitted on the Sundays of Lent. This restraint helps the Church’s praise resound more fully when Easter arrives.

Lent also sets aside the Alleluia, the Church’s cry of resurrection joy. This setting aside is not a rejection of joy,

but a discipline of longing. By fasting even from this word of praise, the liturgy forms us to hope and to desire God more deeply.

Christians once expressed this discipline with a custom known as the “burial of the Alleluia.” Before Lent began, the word Alleluia was written down, sung one final time, and then symbolically laid to rest throughout the season. The point was not that joy had vanished but that it was being held back, like a seed beneath the soil, awaiting Easter morning. This follows a biblical rhythm of silence before glory and surrender before new life. As Christ passes through the tomb, so the Church lets its brightest word fall silent. Then, at the Easter Vigil, the Alleluia is not merely taken up again, it rises in jubilant praise.

There are visual changes as well. The Church uses the very look and feel of the liturgical space to form our prayer, so that what we see supports the Church’s seasonal invitation. Lent’s restraint is purposeful. Its seasonal elements are meant to draw us into the mystery. This often means a simpler sanctuary, fewer competing focal points, and a clearer visual line to the key liturgical foundations of the space, the altar, ambo, baptismal font and the presider’s chair so that the liturgy’s central signs can speak with quiet authority (Built of Living Stones, no. 55; no. 67; GIRM, no. 305).

LENT AND THE JOURNEY OF THE ELECT

Lent forms the whole Church, but it also carries a special urgency for those preparing to enter the Church for the first time.

From the Church’s earliest centuries, Lent has been linked inseparably to baptism and its time of preparation. While all the baptized enter these forty days as a call to deeper conversion, the season takes on a particular intensity for those preparing to enter the Church. At the beginning of Lent, catechumens take a decisive step at the Rite of Election which is celebrated on the First Sunday of Lent. From that moment, they are known as the Elect.

Their presence reveals something essential about Lent, that conversion is never a private journey. The Elect are publicly chosen by the Church, their names

inscribed as a sign that God has called them. Yet they do not walk alone. The Church calls the whole assembly to accompany them through prayer, witness, and example, as they draw near to Christian initiation at Easter (OCIA, no. 4).

As the weeks of Lent unfold, the Scriptures speak of thirst and living water, blindness and new sight, death and new life. These are not only stories for the Elect, but also mirrors held up for all. As the Elect are strengthened by prayer, the already baptized are invited to examine their own lives and renew their trust in God’s mercy. Their final preparation reminds the baptized to live more fully the promises once made at the baptismal font.

LENT'S DESTINATION

Lent is not an end in itself. It leads us to stand once again at the baptismal font and renew our promises. It is when the Church proclaims once again that Christ is risen and that we are a resurrection people.

As Lent begins, perhaps the simplest prayer is this: “Lord, let your Church’s prayer form me to be more like you.” Then allow the liturgy to do what it is meant to do, make saints out of ordinary people one Sunday at a time.

Becoming One

When we pray at Mass, we come together in the assembly as the Body of Christ. The way we pray symbolizes the unity we share with one another and with God. 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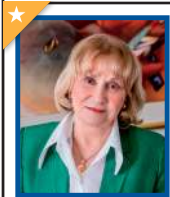


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
