The Resurrection of the Lord



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

As we gather as a family of faith to celebrate Easter, we do so not as a people untouched by the struggles of our time, but as a community that has walked honestly through both grace and shadow. This year, our Lenten journey unfolded against the backdrop of a nation—and a world—marked by deep divisions, uncertainty, and the persistent reality of war and human suffering. We did not set these realities aside; rather, we carried them into our prayer, our liturgies, and our shared life as a parish. And it is precisely there, in that intersection of faith and fragility, that Easter now speaks its most powerful word.

Throughout Lent, the people of Holy Trinity Parish entered deeply into the practices that shape Christian life: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Yet these were not simply disciplines undertaken in isolation; they became ways of coping, of remaining grounded amid the noise and strain of a fractured public life. In a time when voices often compete rather than listen, our communal prayer—at daily Mass, Ignatian Retreats, Stations of the Cross, a Eucharistic Holy Hour, and various prayer groups on Zoom—created spaces of stillness and attentiveness. These were moments in which we could bring before God not only our personal burdens, but also the wounds of our nation and world.

There was a particular poignancy this year in our celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. In a society

often marked by accusation and division, the quiet encounter with God's mercy reminded us that healing begins not in winning arguments, but in the humble acknowledgment of our need for grace. Many spoke of experiencing a renewed sense of peace—an inner anchoring that allowed them to face the external turbulence with greater clarity and compassion.

Our parish's engagement in works of justice and charity during Lent also took on renewed urgency. In the face of ongoing conflicts across the globe and the suffering of displaced peoples, our outreach efforts—whether through direct service, advocacy, or material support—became a way of resisting despair. These acts did not solve the immense challenges before us, but they affirmed something essential: that even in a world overshadowed by violence and division, love remains active, concrete, and transformative.

Holy Week brought these themes into sharper focus. On Palm Sunday, we entered into the tension between acclaim and rejection—a tension that resonates deeply in a divided society. On Holy Thursday, as we witnessed the washing of feet, we were reminded that true authority is expressed in service, not domination. In a time when power is often contested and misunderstood, this simple, profound gesture of Christ offered a different vision of leadership, one rooted in humility and care for the other.

Good Friday, perhaps more than ever, felt like a mirror held up to our world. As we venerated the Cross, we could not help but see reflected in it the suffering of those caught in war, the grief of families torn apart, and the quiet anguish of those who feel unseen or unheard. The Cross stands as a stark acknowledgment that evil and death are real and devastating forces. Lent invited us not to deny this reality, but to face it with courage and faith.

And yet, we did not remain at the Cross.

The Easter Vigil broke into that darkness with light—first the small flame of the Paschal candle, then the gradual illumination of the entire assembly. It is a powerful sign: that light does not eliminate darkness by force, but overcomes it by presence. The proclamation of the Resurrection does not ignore the

reality of suffering; it transforms it. It declares that death and evil, though real, are not ultimate.

This is the hope that Easter offers to a weary and divided world.

For us as a parish, this hope is not abstract. It is embodied in the lives of those who entered the Church at the Easter Vigil, whose journeys of faith remind us that God continues to call and to gather. It is heard in the voices of our music ministry, whose offerings lifted our hearts from lament to praise. It is seen in the quiet fidelity of those who serve—our staff, liturgical ministers, our outreach volunteers, our educators, and so many others—who, week after week, make the life of this community possible. It is also found in the life of our Holy Trinity School, where young people are being formed not only in knowledge, but in faith, compassion, and a sense of responsibility for the world they will inherit. In them, we glimpse the future, not without its challenges, but filled with possibility.

As we move into the Easter season, we do so with a renewed sense of mission. The Resurrection sends us forth—not to escape the realities of our world, but to engage them with hope. We are called to be people who bridge divides, who listen with patience, who act with justice, and who remain rooted in the love of Christ.

The weeks ahead will offer many opportunities for us to continue this work together through worship, formation, service, and fellowship. Next month, scores of our children will be receiving their First Eucharist and on May 3rd Cardinal McElroy will confirm one hundred of our teenagers. Each of our faith gatherings, each act of kindness, each moment of prayer becomes a way of living the Resurrection in our time.

This Easter, we give thanks for the grace that has sustained us through Lent, for the honesty with which we have faced the darkness around us, and for the light that now shines in Christ. And we hold fast to this promise: no matter how deep the night, the dawn has already begun. Alleluia. Christ is risen.

On behalf of my fellow Jesuits, Fathers Campbell, Dennis, Earl, and Kelley, I wish you and your family a Happy Easter!

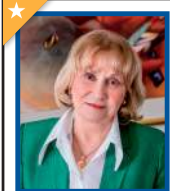
