Born Of Water And Shaped For Service

At the Easter Vigil, after fire and Word, we turn toward water. The Church does not leave that turning to chance. We gather around it, bless it, and enter it. We are marked by it. In that deliberate, bodily turning toward water, the Church proclaims something decisive. It declares that resurrection is not only remembered; it is also received.

Easter and baptism belong together. Baptism is how the resurrection becomes personal and communal. Just as Christ is risen, we rise with him in baptism. For us, the waters of rebirth are the threshold of resurrection. From the Church's earliest days, believers were instructed to be baptized into "living water" that flows and gives life. It made visible the crossing from one way of life into another.

In Catholic tradition, the font has often been described as the "womb of the Church." In those waters, Christians are born into Christ's Body. The Church has always known that beginnings matter and that beginnings are worth marking. Baptism is not a private milestone. It is the beginning of a new life in Christ. In ways suited to each time and place, the Church has sought to mark that beginning within her common life, as communities discern how best to express what they believe. Easter proclaims that Christ is risen. Baptism proclaims that we belong to his risen life. That belonging establishes dignity and responsibility.

The Second Vatican Council teaches that all the baptized share in Christ's priestly mission. This is referred to as the "common priesthood." It is not symbolic language. It means that every baptized person participates in the Church's worship, discernment, and witness. At Holy Trinity, this is not abstract theology. It is embodied. Lay preaching, shared leadership, pastoral councils, justice ministries, liturgical ministries, formation teams, and daily service are not simply parish structures. They are expressions of

baptismal dignity. They reflect confidence that the Spirit is given broadly and that the Church flourishes when the baptized live consciously from that gift.

Yet this common priesthood does not mean sameness. Saint Paul's image of the Body reminds us that unity requires differentiation. Each member contributes according to the gifts entrusted by God. Some are called to ordained ministry; others to teaching, organizing, healing, advocating, accompanying. All are necessary. Our uniqueness is not erased by Baptism. It is ordered toward communion. Baptism makes us members of the Body. Vocation shapes our service within it.

This communion, equal in dignity and diverse in roles, is what the Church today calls synodality. In recent years, the Church has spoken often of synodality. Under the guidance of Pope Francis and now Pope Leo XIV, synodality has been described not as a new initiative, but as a way of being Church by walking together in communion, attentive to the Holy Spirit, and rooted in shared baptism. It is participation grounded not in preference or power, but in the grace first given at the font.

Synodality begins at the waters that first made us one. Because we are baptized, we listen. Because we share one Spirit, we discern together. Because we belong to Christ, we offer our distinct gifts for the good of the whole.

This is not simply a parliamentary process. It is, at its heart, a sacramental reality. In a parliament or a congress, authority arises from negotiation. In the Church, unity arises from baptism. Before we deliberate, before we vote, before we form committees, we have already been joined to Christ and to one another through water and the Spirit. Baptism establishes a communion that precedes discussion.

Synodality flows from that prior communion. We walk together because we have already been made one. Listening, therefore, is spiritual before it is strategic. We listen because we believe the Holy Spirit has been poured into the whole Body. The Spirit speaks through ordained ministry and through the baptized faithful. The task of discernment is to recognize together the voice of the Holy Spirit. Baptism makes this possible for a people shaped by the same waters and oriented toward the same mission.

This communion becomes visible whenever we gather for the Eucharist. In the early Church, baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist were celebrated together at Easter. The newly baptized moved directly from water to table. The journey proclaimed a truth that remains true for us today. The community that gathers at the altar is a body born from the same waters. The Church's worship makes visible what baptism has already accomplished among us. And so the Church always returns to water to remember, to renew, and to reorient.

Because we have passed through these waters, we recognize the dignity of every person. Sharing one Spirit, we offer our gifts for the life of the world. And belonging to Christ, we are sent — together.

During this Easter season, when we renew our baptismal promises and are sprinkled with blessed water, we are invited to notice how we are living from that beginning. Where did I enter this communion? How am I living from those waters now? How does our shared baptism shape the way we walk together as Church?

Easter is not only the celebration of what happened to Jesus. It is the proclamation of what has happened to us. We have died with Christ. We have risen with Christ. We live as a baptismal people. We are marked by water, shaped by grace, united in dignity, and walking together in hope. And the place where that new life began remains among us, quietly anchoring our common life, standing at the heart of who we are, and reminding us, each time we turn toward it, that everything we do flows from that enduring gift entrusted to this community.

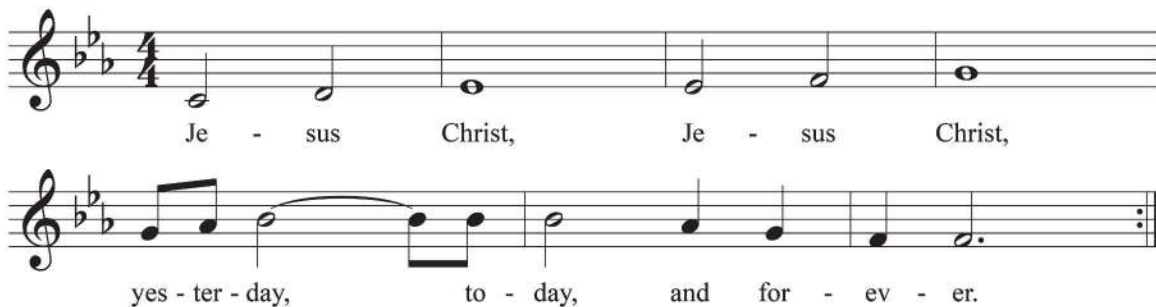

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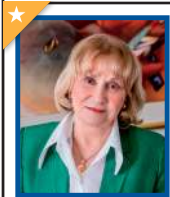


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
