FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

On War, Conscience, and Our Call to Be a People of Peace

In recent weeks we have seen much controversy emanating from our nation's conflict in Iran and the Middle East. Catholic leaders, including Pope Leo XIV and our own Archbishop McElroy have made strong statements against the war. Some have asked: What are we, as Catholics, to think? How are we to respond? How do we remain faithful amid such complexity?

I write to you not to offer political conclusions, but to guide us as a parish in forming our consciences, deepening our faith, and remaining united in Christ.

1. A Moral Framework Rooted in the Gospel

The Church does not approach war lightly. Across centuries, she has developed a moral tradition that seeks both to restrain violence and to uphold justice. This includes what is often called the "Just War" doctrine, which insists that the use of force is subject to rigorous conditions of moral legitimacy, such as:

- A just war is a response to an existing or imminent

- attack, not a preventative action.
- A just war must have the right intention, not a series of ever-changing intentions or objectives.
- A just war must clearly show that the benefits will outweigh the harm which will be done.

At the same time, the Church never ceases to proclaim that peace is not merely the absence of war, but the fruit of justice, dialogue, and respect for human dignity.

As Catholics, our first task is not to adopt positions, but to form our consciences in light of the Gospel.

2. Holding Complexity with Humility

War presents moral situations that are rarely simple. Faithful Catholics may, in good conscience, arrive at different prudential judgments about particular conflicts or policies.

This does not mean "anything goes." It does mean that we approach one another with humility, recognizing that no single perspective fully captures the moral weight of these realities.

In a time when many voices around us are often loud, the Christian is called to be thoughtful, prayerful, and humble.

3. Our Unity Is in Christ

Perhaps the greatest danger in moments like this is not *continued on page 2*

disagreement, but division.

We are not first members of political parties or ideological camps. We are members of the Body of Christ. At every Eucharist, we are gathered together—across differences, across opinions, across experiences—into one communion. There, we stand before the Lord not as adversaries, but as brothers and sisters.

Let us guard that unity carefully. Let us speak with charity, listen with respect, and resist the temptation to reduce one another to positions.

4. Prayer as Our First Response

In the face of war, it can feel that our actions are small. Yet the Church reminds us that prayer is never small. I invite us, as a parish, to:

- Pray for all victims of war—especially the innocent, the displaced, and the grieving
- Pray for those who serve in the military, often bearing heavy burdens
- Pray for leaders, that they may act with wisdom, restraint, and a genuine desire for peace

In the coming weeks, we will include special intentions at Mass and offer opportunities for communal prayer for peace.

5. Seeing the Human Face of War

War is never an abstraction. It is lived in the lives of real people—families separated, communities lives forever changed. I encourage you to:

- Learn about the human impact of the conflict
- Support humanitarian efforts where possible
- Allow compassion—not ideology—to shape your response

This Wednesday evening at 6:15 PM in McKenna Hall, we will have a first-hand report on the causalities and consequences of the war from Father Dan Carrou, SJ, who serves as the Director of Jesuit Refugee Services in Beirut, Lebanon.

6. Reacting to Digital Media

Many of us are engaging these issues in a digital

world that often amplifies division and simplifies complexity. I invite you especially to:

- Seek depth over slogans
- Engage sources that challenge as well as confirm your views
- Bring your questions into the light of faith and community

The Church needs your voice—thoughtful, faithful, and courageous.

7. The Eucharist: Where No One Is Distant

Each time we gather at the altar, we are united not only with those present, but with the whole Body of Christ—across nations, across suffering, even across death. There are no “distant” people in the Eucharist.

The victims of war, those who fight, those who lead—all are held in the prayer of Christ, which we enter. This is both our consolation and our responsibility.

Conclusion

Dear friends, we do not face these questions alone. We walk together—as a parish, as a Church—guided by the wisdom of our tradition, sustained by prayer, and united in Christ.

Let us be a community that does not turn away from the realities of the world, but engages them with faith, hope, and love.

May the Risen Lord, the Prince of Peace, guide our hearts, enlighten our minds, and strengthen our resolve to be instruments of His peace in a wounded world.
