## The Church is Growing in Prayer and Action for Mental Health

Have you ever heard the saying that a crisis is also a time of opportunity? This sentiment is often related to the ancient Greek heritage of the word “crisis,” which implies a turning point or time of decision. We have cause to hope that the Church is moving through such a turning point in relation to its understanding of and action for mental health. According to a West Health-Gallup poll released last December, the number of Americans rating their mental health as “excellent” has recently fallen below 30% for the first time in 25 years. By far, the most significant reported declines in mental health have occurred since 2020 with the challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic. May is Mental Health Awareness Month – a fitting time to reflect on how the continuing impacts of the pandemic and social upheaval are affecting people around the world. We remember especially the young, those challenged by poverty, hunger, or forced migration, and those threatened by the violence and warfare prevalent in so many countries.

Having brought so much upheaval, it is not surprising that the years during and since the pandemic have also marked a new opportunity for the Catholic Church to increase understanding of mental illness and to improve mental health in our communities. In June 2021, Pope Francis offered an address to a national conference for mental health in Italy in which he stated, “The pandemic has presented health workers with enormous challenges,

showing us all the need to have an appropriate approach to health care to ensure no one is left behind and to care for all in an inclusive and participatory manner.” Pope Francis went on to say, “I therefore hope [to] inspire in institutions, educational agencies and the various spheres of society a renewed sensitivity to those suffering from mental health problems, in order to instill greater confidence in so many of our brothers and sisters marked by frailty. It is also a question of helping to fully overcome the stigma with which mental illness has often been branded and, in general, to ensure that the culture of community prevails over the mentality of rejection.”

One outcome of the Vatican's increased attention to mental health has been the growth of the International Association of Catholic Mental Health Ministers (CMHM) which provides resources to Catholic institutions to support them in outreach to promote mental health. Some Holy Trinity parishioners may remember Deacon Ed Shoener, Founder and President of the association, who visited Holy Trinity in March of last year to speak about his own family's challenges with mental health and about ways in which Catholic parishes can better support the mental wellness needs of their communities. Since 2021, CMHM has increased its collaboration with the Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network and the Vatican's *Click To Pray* app to regularly incorporate prayers, reflections, and digital media relating to mental health and its role, together with other aspects of spirituality and physical health, in the holistic wellbeing of peoples and communities.

The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has also heard and responded to this call to increase promotion of mental health and welcome and care for those dealing with mental health challenges. Last September, the U.S. Bishops announced a National Catholic Mental Health Campaign, including conferences, digital media, advocacy, and annual commemorations of a Mental Health Sunday and related novena prayers. Announcing the campaign, Bishop Barron and Archbishop Borys Gudziak stated, "As pastors, we want to emphasize this point to anyone who is suffering from mental illness or facing mental health challenges: nobody and nothing can alter or diminish your God-given dignity. You are a beloved child of God, a God of healing and hope." The bishops went on to say, "Eventually, these challenges touch the lives of all... We invite all Catholics and people of good will to advocate for bipartisan legislation and policies that address the severe lack of health care resources for prevention and treatment of mental health conditions. Together, we can work towards a more just and compassionate society."

Locally, the Archdiocese of Washington offers a number of resources for those affected by mental illness. These include a Monthly Mass for Persons Living with Mental Health Challenges on every second Saturday of the month at 11:00 a.m. Further information can be found on their website or by writing to [specialneedsministry@adw.org](mailto:specialneedsministry@adw.org). Next Saturday, May 9th, at 11:00 a.m., Cardinal Robert McElroy will celebrate the annual Mass for Persons Living with Mental Health Challenges at the Cathedral of

St. Matthew. This Mass commemorates the feast of Saint Dymphna, patron saint of those suffering from mental illnesses.

In addition to numerous public and private mental health professionals offering direct services to those affected by mental illness, Catholic Charities of Washington provides services through Anchor Counseling and their Behavioral Health Services office ([www.catholiccharitiesdc.org](http://www.catholiccharitiesdc.org)). Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Arlington provides services through their Mental Health Counseling office ([www.cdda.net](http://www.cdda.net)). *(If you or someone you know is experiencing thoughts of suicide or a crisis, please reach out immediately to the national Suicide & Crisis Lifeline by phoning 988.)*

In the past year, a group of Holy Trinity parishioners interested in learning and sharing more about the Catholic Church's growing prayer and action for mental health have been meeting. This new Mental Health Ministry plans to begin simply, by sharing more information on some of the initiatives described here and related efforts. In the fall, the group hopes to organize a gathering for parishioners in the spirit of synodality regarding realities of mental health in our families and community. They also will share activities that arise around World Mental Health Day (October 10th annually) and the Church's national Mental Health Sunday (October 11th this year).

## IGNATIAN CORNER

### FAITH SHARING

Faith Sharing is one of those rare places where we are not meant to bring any kind of expertise, planning or forethought. Faith Sharing is a place where our only concern is consuming the Gospel and letting God speak to us. In my life, I'm surrounded by a lot of experts – people that know a great deal about a subject. In Faith Sharing, there is no expertise required. It's somewhat countercultural to the hustle and bustle of life in the DMV. To simply encounter God.

Trinity Faith Sharing consists of weekly small group (about 8 people) meetings where we start out by sharing our spiritual consolations & desolations over the past week, that is, moments where we felt an increase in faith, hope, and love, or where we felt their decrease. We are encouraged to listen deeply to one another rather than solve problems or give advice. Then, we read the first reading and Gospel for the following week. At that point, everyone may share however they feel moved. Perhaps a word, phrase, or image from the passage brings about feelings showing God at work in our lives. Sometimes, the readings very much speak to us and we can talk about where we connect with scripture. Other times, we may just want to listen or quietly contemplate what we have read or what others are saying. In any case, it's about how each of us hears God's voice. As a group, we set the expectations that we are all here to listen to others and share of ourselves.

For me, the most important aspect of Faith Sharing is the idea that God meets me where I am. I do not need to prepare or be an expert. I do not need to bring anything other than myself. I very much appreciate the opportunity to encounter God in the words, in the silence or in the insights of others. Faith Sharing is about sharing with others where God finds you. In so many areas of our lives we face expectations, but in Faith Sharing we are free to encounter. We have Trinity Faith Sharing groups during the fall and the season of Lent, and the Young Adult Community meets for faith sharing every Thursday evening at 7 in St. Ignatius Chapel. All are welcome.
