What is Ignatian Discernment?

In a bulletin article last month, I recently explored the various reasons why the Ignatian practice of discerning God's will can be very helpful when making a major decision. One reason is that while God the Creator gives us reason, intuition, and imagination, those capacities can be distorted by cultural assumptions, bias, and other forces that can undermine our ability to make a wise decision. Another is that while we desire to cooperate with the coming of God's kingdom and to act as new creation people, we face social and internal forces that can oppose Christ's mission. This can make it difficult to know how to cooperate with him. For all these reasons it is important at certain times to use Ignatius' approach to discerning God's will. *Of course, I concluded that article without telling you what Ignatian discernment is!*

Discerning God's will is not about straining to guess some mysterious divine purpose hidden in the clouds. It is the practice of allowing ourselves to be guided by the Holy Spirit to discover how the risen Jesus wants us to cooperate with his mission in our world in our small way. Ignatius believed the Holy Spirit works through our feelings and thoughts to lead us to cooperate with Christ. Ignatius offers practical ways to attune ourselves to the guidance of the Holy Spirit. A word about the expression "God's will": To our modern ears that can sound like a command from the general set in stone. Speaking of God's desire for us and the world and God's purpose realized in Christ, better



captures the Biblical notion of God's will.

In this article, I will share with you one Ignatian practice for discovering our role in Christ's mission. I begin by describing the fundamental dispositions required for discerning God's purpose. By dispositions, I mean an attitude and approach to the Christian life that is needed for discernment. Then I sketch one of the three ways Ignatius suggest for doing this.

Fundamental Dispositions. The Ignatian approach to discerning God's desire for me depends on our cultivating through prayer three fundamental dispositions. The first is a growing relationship with Jesus Christ inspired by the Holy Spirit. We grow this relationship through our participation in the liturgy, the sacramental life of the Church, personal prayer, and serving the poor. It assumes

at the depths of reality is the dynamic life of God expressed through Christ and the Spirit of God. It involves a growing attunement to the ways the Holy Spirit nudges us, attracts us, fills us with desires to know Christ, love him, and serve him by loving others. The reason Ignatius emphasizes developing a relationship with Christ as the basis for discernment is because we are discerning what Christ wants us to do as part of God's coming kingdom. The closer we are to Christ the easier it is to discern what he wants us to do.

The second disposition follows from the first. It involves a growing desire in us to participate in Christ's mission in the world. Ignatius believes that the risen Jesus is present and active throughout the world especially through his Church. Christ continues to offer the world his freedom, peace, justice, and love especially in places of conflict and to those in need. The Church's role in this worldwide mission is crucial. By the Church, I do not just mean priests and religious. Every baptized person by virtue of their baptism is called to be a part of Christ's mission. Discovering what that means requires discernment. But first we must realize Christ has a worldwide mission and he wants all of us to participate in it. As a person grows close to Jesus, her desire to do what Christ asks grows. The final disposition calls for a graced openness to whatever God desires for us to do. This requires a person come to trust God. It calls for a growing freedom from our need for control and from our fears and anxieties. It also depends on a desire to walk with Christ and serve him in love. It can take a while to receive these graces!

The Process. The first step in the discernment process is to clarify the choice you are trying to make. For instance, "I will take this position or I will not accept it." Next, spend time gathering information about the choice considering all relevant data. You will use this information to create a list of pros and cons for each choice always including the weightier reasons for each. During a time when your interior life is quiet, begin to pray over these pros and cons asking for the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Start by quieting down and being aware you are in God's presence and that God looks on you with delight. Prayerfully consider the pros and cons for each choice. As you go through each list you may drop some reasons or add others. As you prayerfully consider the reasons, notice if your will is drawn to one choice over the other. Ask God to help

you answer—which one is for the greater good? Which allows you to cooperate more with Christ's mission and what he wants you to do? If you are making a serious decision, this is not a one-time process. Instead, you want to repeat this process gaining evidence for which way God moves your will until it becomes clear what God wants you to do. It can be very helpful to engage in this process with a trained spiritual director. Finally, after arriving at a decision ask God for some sort of confirmation that this is God's desire for you. This can come in different forms such as a sense of peace, deep conviction, or an increase in faith, hope, or love. To learn more, I recommend Timothy M.
