Holy Trinity Church: An Evolving Space For Communal And Personal Worship

The best church buildings provide an environment for both communal liturgy and individual prayer. How Holy Trinity parishioners participated at Mass and practiced personal devotions has evolved since the church was dedicated in 1851, and our church's furnishings have evolved as well.

A visitor to new Holy Trinity in 1851 would have found a bright and welcoming space, with clear sight lines to the raised sanctuary from all pews. The church is oriented to the east, so prayers were directed towards Jerusalem and the awaited resurrection. There were two small altars flanking the main altar, which was separated from the congregation by a rail where the faithful knelt to receive Communion. Fluted, Ionic pilasters around the walls recalled the permanence and authority of the Jesuit churches in Rome.

Around the walls of the nave were the fourteen Stations of the Cross for devotions, and statues of Mary and Joseph. In the earliest photos of the church, we see banks of votive candles in front of the statues, to be lit to accompany personal prayer.

There was no shortage of saints' statues in Holy Trinity in its first 100 years, including a Pietà, and parishioners donated statues of St. Francis Xavier, St. Rita, St. Têrèse of Lisieux, and the Infant Jesus of Prague.

In the late 1880s, the windows were filled with the stained-glass we see today. Stained glass changes not just the interior light and ambiance, but symbolically "baptizes" the worship space, setting it apart from secular space. There is also stained glass in the skylight over the sanctuary, depicting the four evangelists with their traditional symbols, and a window over the main doors, which has the "Shield of Trinity," illustrating the three persons in the Holy Trinity, separate but co-equal.

Our earliest photographs of the sanctuary date from 1900 (see above), with the church decorated for its 50th

anniversary celebration. The high altar and tabernacle are center stage, overlooked by a large painting of Christ breaking bread at Emmaus. A vigil light is suspended from the ceiling to emphasize the Real Presence in the tabernacle, and remind the faithful to genuflect before it. The front of the altar had the Lamb of God relief sculpture which is preserved in the present altar. Three Stations of the Cross are visible on the sanctuary walls, and there is a large crucifix by the statue of Joseph on the south side of the sanctuary.

In 1920, the new pastor launched a comprehensive redecoration of the church so that “the devotion of the faithful should be intensified by statues and paintings of Our Lord, Our Lady, and the Saints.” He had a marble canopy built over the altar, installed the large crucifix within it, and flanked it with niches for statues of the Sacred Heart and Mary.

Significant changes came to Catholic practice with the Second Vatican Council 1962-65, which embraced the call for liturgical reforms which had been growing through the 1950s. There was to be greater lay participation at Mass, creating a more interactive Mass. Reciting the rosary during the Mass was discouraged and other pious practices were de-emphasized.

How did this renewal play out at Holy Trinity? In the 1960s statues of saints, votive candles and other decorations were removed from the sanctuary, and a new altar was installed from which the priest celebrated the Mass while facing the people. 1978-79 saw further renovations, which created the sanctuary essentially as we see it today. The Communion rail was removed, leaving no barrier between clergy and congregation. The side altars and statues of Mary and Joseph were removed and the walls behind them opened up, which increased the sanctuary area. Into the back walls of these two new spaces round windows were fitted with stained glass portraits of two great Jesuit saints, Robert Bellarmine and Isaac Jogues.

The tabernacle was moved to the new side chapel on the gospel side, in keeping with post-Vatican II practice. A new cross was hung in the sanctuary, made of Lucite with brass and copper fittings with the lamb of God in the center. Another addition is the statue of Mary and the Christ Child, a splendid reproduction of a 15th century German original.

Holy Trinity was most recently refreshed in 2018-19 when, in addition to the new paint, pews and

floors, the stained-glass windows and Stations were cleaned and restored, and the electronic sound system improved dramatically. The result is the beautiful, light-filled church interior we have today, as ideal for the worship of our own time as was the church for those who celebrated within it during its inauguration 175 years ago.

Holy Trinity will celebrate the 175th Anniversary Mass of our church building on Saturday, June 13. The Mass will conclude with a festive procession from the church to the campus of Georgetown Visitation, which

will start our annual parish picnic. *(N.B. There will be no 5:30 PM Mass that evening.)*

The celebration will include the premiere of a newly commissioned musical work by Tim Keyes, featuring the refrain: “*How lovely is your dwelling, Lord, where thirsting hearts awake to grace; from living waters we are raised, one people, born to show your face.*” We give thanks for 175 years in this sacred building, remembering the thousands of disciples baptized in living water and sent forth as missionaries of the Gospel.

As advisors to the pastor, PPC members assist the pastor in discerning, articulating and communicating to other parishioners the identity and mission of the parish, and they assist the pastor in assuring fidelity to that identity and mission. 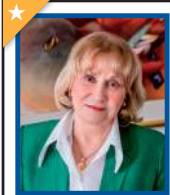
