FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Holy Trinity Church, Georgetown: A House of Faith in the Story of America

As Holy Trinity Parish celebrates the 175th anniversary of its church building, we give thanks not only for a remarkable structure, but also for a sacred place that has stood at the crossroads of American history. Dedicated in 1851, the church has witnessed nearly two centuries of worship, service, sacrifice, and national transformation. This anniversary is made even more significant because it coincides with the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Together, these anniversaries remind us that much of the history of the United States has been lived, celebrated, mourned, and sanctified within the walls of Holy Trinity Church.

For Father Dennis and for me, this year marks another milestone - the 40th anniversary of our ordinations as Jesuit priests. That coincidence has provided a unique opportunity to reflect on the many ways our own priestly journey has intertwined with the rich history of the Society of Jesus, the Church in the U.S., and the faith-filled community of Holy Trinity. In a special way, these anniversaries invite all of us to remember that history is not merely a record of the past; it is a living inheritance that continues to shape our identity and mission today.

The history of Holy Trinity Parish reaches back even further than the church building itself. As many of you know, the parish community was founded in 1787, and our chapel was dedicated in 1794. Our origins lie in the earliest years of the American Republic, when Catholics were still a small minority in a nation that was defining its commitment to religious liberty. The parish emerged during the same era in which the Constitution was being drafted and the principles of the Declaration of Independence were being tested in the life of the young nation.

This year's anniversary celebrations have also provided an opportunity to reconnect with the deeper roots of the Jesuit and Catholic story in Maryland. On June 6, over 50 parishioners and I enjoyed a one-day pilgrimage to St. Thomas Manor and Historic St. Mary's City. At St. Thomas Manor, one of the oldest continuously occupied Jesuit residences in the United States, we stood on land

where generations of Jesuits ministered to Maryland Catholics long before Georgetown existed as a thriving urban parish. At St. Mary's City, the site of Maryland's first colonial settlement and the birthplace of religious toleration in English North America, we were reminded of the courage and vision of those early Catholics who sought to build a society where faith could be practiced freely.

That pilgrimage underscored an important truth: Holy Trinity's story did not begin in 1851 or even in 1787. Its roots stretch back to the earliest days of Catholicism in Maryland and to the Jesuit missionaries whose faith, perseverance, and sacrifice helped establish the foundations upon which our parish now stands. Walking those historic grounds allowed us to see our own parish as part of a much larger narrative spanning nearly four centuries.

The present church building was dedicated on June 15, 1851. Designed by architect Patrick Charles Keely, one of the most important Catholic church architects of the nineteenth century, the Greek Revival structure quickly became a landmark in Georgetown. The noble sanctuary reflected the aspirations of a growing Catholic community eager to contribute to the spiritual and civic life of the nation.

Only a decade after its dedication, however, the church would find itself caught up in one of the greatest crises in American history. During the American Civil War, Holy Trinity Church served as a hospital for wounded Union soldiers. The sacred space where parishioners gathered for Mass became a place of healing and care for those injured in the conflict that threatened to tear the nation apart. The transformation of the church into a hospital reflected the Gospel values that have long animated the parish: compassion, service, and solidarity with those who suffer.

The Civil War also brought another notable visitor to Holy Trinity. Abraham Lincoln came to Georgetown on several occasions and is known to have visited the church. While Lincoln's legacy belongs to the entire nation, his presence at Holy Trinity links the parish to one of the most consequential periods in American history. The struggle to preserve the Union and advance the cause of human freedom unfolded not far from these walls.

As Washington grew into the nation's capital, Holy Trinity became the spiritual home for generations of citizens, public servants, immigrants, and leaders. Throughout the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, parishioners experienced the joys and sorrows of

American life through wars, economic upheavals, social change, and moments of national celebration. The church stood as a place where faith offered meaning amid uncertainty and hope amid challenge.

The true history of Holy Trinity, however, is not found only in famous visitors or national events. It is found in the countless parishioners who were baptized, confirmed, married, and buried here. It is found in the generations of Jesuits and countless teachers and lay ministers, who have accompanied the faithful through every stage of life. It is found in the immigrants who sought opportunity, the families who built Georgetown and Washington, the students who passed through nearby schools and universities.

Over 175 years, Holy Trinity has witnessed the nation expand, endure civil war, welcome waves of immigrants, confront racial injustice, fight world wars, land on the moon, and enter the digital age. Through all these changes, the parish has remained faithful to its mission of proclaiming the Gospel and serving God's people.

As we celebrate this 175th anniversary in the same year that our nation marks the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, we are reminded that the history of Holy Trinity and the history of America have often intersected. The ideals proclaimed in 1776—human dignity, liberty, and equality—find their deepest foundation in the Christian conviction that every person is created in the image and likeness of God.

The church building that has stood since 1851 is therefore more than a historic landmark. It is a living testament to faith enduring across generations. Within its walls, much of the American story has been reflected and refracted through the lives of ordinary believers seeking to follow Christ. As we honor the past, we also look forward with gratitude and hope, confident that Holy Trinity Church will continue to serve as a beacon of faith, justice, and service for generations yet to come.

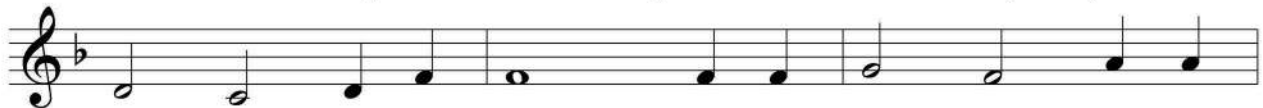
