Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Irish At Holy Trinity Parish

People from Ireland or of Irish descent lived in Georgetown before the founding of Holy Trinity, or Trinity Church as it was first named. Among them were Alexander and James Doyle, descendants of Irish Catholics who had settled in Maryland. Moving to Georgetown in the 1780s, they published a newspaper and a popular Guide to Prayer and Devotion.

Alexander became a successful merchant on High Street, now Wisconsin Avenue, and a prosperous property owner. His role in constructing the original Trinity Church is disputed but his newspaper, the *Impartial Observer and Washington Advertiser*, referred to him as “the protector and principal agent of Trinity Church.” It was probably through his influence that John Threlkeld, an Anglican, sold for a minimal fee the lot on which the original Trinity Church was built.

While descendants of old Maryland Catholic families were initially the principal group of white Trinity parishioners, the Irish soon became the largest foreign-born group at Holy Trinity, even before the great wave of Irish immigrants began arriving in the 1830s. Some were merchants and shopkeepers; more were skilled workers



and laborers. Newly-arrived Irish laborers were engaged in digging the Potomac Company Canal and working on the streets of Washington. Irish workers and their families lived along the waterfront below Bridge Street, now M Street, at the time the poorest area of Georgetown. More prosperous Irish lived on the higher ground above the river.

Immigration from Ireland slowed during England’s wars with Napoleonic France and the War of 1812 but resumed afterward. Nearly a half million Irish came to the United States between 1815 and the beginning of the Famine in 1845, an influx not welcomed by Nativist Americans, organized as the “Know Nothings.”

Georgetown College served as a first employer for many single young male immigrants from Ireland, who worked as “carpenters, cooks, cobblers, tailors, and farm workers” until they found employment elsewhere. Some took other jobs after a few months; some worked at the College for several years. Many had a portion of their earnings sent by the College to relatives in Ireland.

The partial failure of the potato crop in Ireland in 1845 ushered in a devastating famine because the Irish peasantry was totally dependent upon the potato. When the famine, remembered by the Irish as the Great Hunger, began the population of Ireland numbered some 8.5 million, but during the famine a million Irish died and over a million emigrated. Massive emigration continued after the potato fungus receded.

By 1855 over a million Irish had sought refuge in the United States. Some of the Irish Famine refugees settled in the poorer sections of Georgetown along the Potomac and found their way to Trinity but the bulk of the new wave of poor Irish settled in an area near North Capitol Street between F and K Streets derisively called “Swampoodle,” reviled because of its poverty. The other Jesuit church in Washington, St. Aloysius, constructed in 1859 on the edge of Swampoodle, served them.

The Irish comprised the largest immigrant group at Holy Trinity throughout the 19th century, and many of Holy Trinity’s Jesuit pastors during the 19th century were born in Ireland. Fr. John McElroy, S.J., who was born in Enniskillen, County Fermahagh, in 1782 briefly served as an assistant pastor at Holy Trinity and then in 1845-46 as pastor. He was succeeded by Fr. Peter O’Flanagan, S.J., who was born at Aghakeeran in County Longford in 1807. He served as pastor here from 1846 to 1852. The present church was built during his time as pastor.

Three other Jesuits born in Ireland subsequently served as pastors at Holy Trinity. Fr. Stephen Kelly, S.J., who served as pastor from 1881 to 1890, was born in Dublin in 1833. Fr. John Murphy, S.J., who

was pastor from 1877 to 1878 and again from 1891 to 1892, was born in Queen’s County in 1844. Fr. William Scanlan, S.J., who served as pastor from 1891 to 1899, was born in Ennis in County Clare in 1840.

Irish Catholics were among the first parishioners of Trinity. The gravestones and monuments of Irish parishioners of Holy Trinity buried in Holy Rood Cemetery are a testament to the new lives that they sought to live in America and to their Catholic faith.
